Club members desiring to become exhibitors at the Fair will be required to make their own entries on the regular entry blanks provided for that purpose by the Fair Association. Club entries should be made in the same manner as all other entries, and will be subject to the same rules and regulations

All entries should be made in strict compliance with the SECTION and CLASS as stated for your project in the FOUR H PREMIUM LIST, in accordance with which all prizes will

No exhibit can be entered in more than one class. Club members will not be required to pay any stall rent or entry fees. Each club member will be held responsible for the care and feeding of his livestock while on exhibition. The Association does not assume any obligation whatever in the care of your stock while on exhibit or the loss or injury of the

Promptly upon receipt of your entry blank, properly filled out, the Secretary will mail to your address an exhibitors' ticket which will allow admittance to the grounds at any time during the Fair. Exhibitors' tickets will be given to exhibitors of livestock only, excluding exhibitors of poultry.

Exhibits may be mailed or forwarded by Express, prepaid, to the County Agent, Marlinton, W. Va., who will place same on exhibition and return same to exhibitor after the Fair. All transportation charges must be paid by the exhibitor.

Classifications marked with an asterisk (*) are made possible by the Pocahontas County Farm Bureau and the State Four H Fair. Payment of premiums will be made by these organizations and not the Fair Association.


