This week we publish the three municipal tickets that have been certified to the recorder. The code provides three ways of making nominations for public office: by petition, by primary election, or by a convention of the voters of any party casting a certain percent of the ballots at a preceding election. The ticket made up of the present council was put in nomination by petition of fifty-six voters. Very few refused to sign and all were not approached as only fifty names were necessary. The other tickets were nominated by conventions. The tickets are all composed of good men, who are not seeking the troublesome responsibility of shouldering the affairs of the municipality, but are put forward by their admiring friends, in an effort to further ends best known to these friends. In behalf of the present mayor and the five councilmen, they have made themselves safe and no selfish efforts in behalf of the town. It would be a slap in the face to take from their hands, in a half finished state, the work of sewer and street improvement, which this council has begun and should be allowed to finish. We advise against changing horses in the midst of the stream.

Last week there were no less than four wrecks on the Greenbrier Division, ranging from the ditching of a single box car on Monday to the derailing of the passenger Saturday night. It has ever been our custom to look up on these numerous wrecks as unavoidable and to pity rather than to blame the management of the road but they are coming with too great regularity, and the rails are spreading in too many places to allow them to be listed as unavoidable. We have been informed that the amount allowed to keep the right of way is less than twenty dollars a mile per month, and an old railroad man who has made a careful inspection of the track on a number of sections has been heard to remark that the only wonder to him is that wrecks do not occur oftener. One must give credit to the management that they have now begun to renew the old ties, but the work is too gradual, and there are almost sure to be derailment and serious ones before the whole track has been renewed. The average life of a railroad tie is seven years. The one's on the Greenbrier division have been down six years, and those who know the country from which most of the ties come, the burnt lands on the east of the river, know that this timber is far from being prime on account of the frequent forest fires.

We were putting it a little strong last week when we said the court refuses to put the several prisoners who are serving jail sentences to work, and left the impression that all the prisoners in jail were available for work. It seems that the court will more than appears on the record, as they are in favor of the measure after discussing it, but failed to make the order because it was evident that it would cost more to employ guards than the work would amount to. In other words it would cost a dollar to get fifty cents worth of work from the prisoners. The court goes still farther and says that if the Commonwealth's Attorney deems the measure judicious, a special session will be called for that purpose. We will admit that the expense will be greater than the work is really worth, but what is more important, it will make a jail sentence mean something. As it now is, staying in jail is a snap to many who have sunk so low as not to be troubled by shame and disgrace. In proof of this we cite a number of instances where persons have run a muck in this town and refused to pay a fine, preferring to serve time until contented with ball and chain. They are very quickly discovered a hard of money and were glad to see all costs, including a dollar a half a day for all time spent in jail. The boarding of prisoners is becoming burdensome, and if a more dollars spent for guards and result in diminishing the number (and we believe it would) we would like to see the experiment.
