The decease of this widely nown citizen of the Levels of ember 30, 1905, is desecving of city of Utrecht, Holland, Through York, a party of Holland emigrants were in now known as the Williams River egion. The new settlers became couraged and disbanded. Some remained in the county, others went to the far west.

Hermanus Stulting located in the Levels, made friends, reared a family of five or six children. Its resides. By occupation he was a silversmith and had never been employed in anyother handicraft until he tried living in the remote recesses of the William River wilds.

His sons are Cornelius, wh vas a teacher and superintendent of schools; Calvin, recently a resdent of Alderson and a teacher in an Alderson High School. His daughters are Mrs Absalom Sydenstricker, a missionary for many years in China; Mrs Floyd Doyle and Mrs Newton Doyle near Valley Centre, Highland County, Virginia, teachers and nodel homekeepers.

From his early youth Mr Stulting was a professor of religion, first in the Dutch church and then upon coming to to Pocahontas united with Oak Grove Presbyterian church dur ing the pastorate of Rev M. D. Dunlap. Mr and Mrs Dunlap were much interested in the wel fare of these strangers and lived to realize what kindness shown to worthy people may result in.

As to his religious experience his last days seemed to have been before his demise, he visited a ministerial friend to express thanks with tearful rapture for the light that had recently beamed on his way and that now it was all that the Land of Buelah signifies with Lim, having Christ for years past the ruling sentiment of his devotional exercises found expression in words like these:

RAILROAD RATES.

Senator Elkins Comes out for It.

Senator Elkins says that railroads must haul by uniform rate. Last term he as chairman of the mittee on Inter State Comnerce thought otherwise. Now he says that all railroads must me something near charging a uniform rate. No more Kansas steers coming east for less than West Virginia cattle. The railroads and the ships must obey the President. We print an article from the Metropolitan Magazine as to what Senator Elkins thinks of the matter. If he indorses it, it must be for the good of

Virginia railroads:

On November 15th the Senate Committee on Inter-State Commerce will meet in Washington to frame a bill provided for railroad rate supervision and regulation by the Government, to be introduced at the coming session of Congress, Senator Stephen B. Elkins of West Virginia is Chairman and of this Comittee and to him is given the credit of blocking legislation on the rate question in the last session of Congress. Senator Elkins openly declared that he was opposed to the President's plans, and by a systematic method of comittee filibustering he was able to frustrate action in the matter. Now the Senater as openly announces that he will co-operate in passing a bill satisfactory to the President. In a recent interview on this subject of railroad legislation Senator Elkins said:

"The President is as emphatic railroad rate and private car line problem must be dealt with decisively. I think there is no doubt that some bill will be passed. Just what its provision will be is, of course, a matter of conjecture. I want to lay emphasis on the fact, however, that, though we may be quick in acting this winter, such action will have epresented careful thought, in estigation and understanding. 1 um a practical railroad man and know whereof I speak when I say that this question affects every country, and is the most important egislative problem Congress has dealt with in forty years. When one stops to consider the fact that some \$14,000,000,000 in railroad property is involved an idea the magninde of the case may obtained. Whether we are indoors or in the street, there is not a single object met by the eye which does not figure in the transaction. What we eat, wear, live in; in fact practically every factor entering human life is subject to railroad transportation, and therefore enters into consideration. It is a momentous question."
