SOME RECOLLECTIONS

OF THE CIVIL WAR

Third Paper

The order to assemble at the residence of Jacob H. Arbogast, near the West prong of Greenbrier river, came on or about the 10th, of May. The next two days were days of great activity. Preparations had to be made for what supposed would be a long absence from home and friends, and the saddest thought of all was, perhaps never to return. The troops embraced in the order, were the Volunteer Company and Company 5 and Company 7 of the 197th. Regiment of Virginia Militia; the former commanded by Capt. Wm. S. Bruffee and the latter by Capt. Wm. F. Arbogast, numbering in all about one hundred and forty men. Provisions for the men had to be supplied by voluntary contributions; and there was no stint. The mothers and daughters of the families of the community, vied with each other in trying to see who could furnish the most and the best things for their loved ones. There were boiled hams, roast chicken, loaves of bread, "sweetened pones," stacks of pies and the big cakes of maple sugar: to think of them almost makes one regret that times are so changed. When the time came to start, two heavily loaded wagons were required to haul our provisions. The order was that the men could go at will. All day long the men could be seen going singly and in groups, stopping along the way to bid farewell to those who were gathered at the houses by the road side. When we arrived at the place appointed we found Lieut. Col. (Dr.) Geo. B. Moffett and Maj. Moffett Poage, both of the Militia Regiment, on hand to take command of the troops. The troops were placed in camp, camp fire built a camp guard detailed and sentinels placed around the camp.

The Phillippi stampede and retreat had occurred a short time before this, and we saw when we got the Staunton and Parkersburg Turnpike, quite a number of refugees going East in search of places of safety. Mr. Arbogast did everything he could to make us comfortable for the night. His house was filled with men overflowing and those who could not get into the house took to the barn and out houses. Early the next morning, he sent two of his boys to a fish trap in the river, a short distance from the house, and they returned with the largest and nicest lot of mountain trout it was ever our privilege to see. The trout were poured out on the ground and we were invited to help ourselves, which we did with the greatest pleasure. Cooking being a new business, we are slow in getting through with our breakfast, and it was rather a late hour when we got started on our march in the direction of Huttonsville. Our music consisted of an old kettle drum, that had been used by the Militia, and a fife. George R. Gam beat the drum and Charles Phillippi played the fife. At this stage of our experience we did most of our marching with our right foot. The left foot was carried along as a kind of "silent partner." The right foot was raised up about as high as we could conveniently get it, and when we all came down together, which was not very often, it made quite a concussion. In order to get us to march together, in addition to the music, the officers "hepped" us a good portion of the time.
