THE CONVENTION.

Continued from Page One. We believe that all nominations for public office, state and local should be made by general primary election, and pledge ourselves to the enactment and enforcement of such a law. We favor the establishment of a public service commission, having general supervision over the public service corporations of the state. We declare for the passage of an adequate and just registration law, and condemn the present law as inadequate to protect the purity of the ballot. We condemn the republican party of the state of West Virginia for its incompetency and financial neglect of a great public duty which has resulted in the suit of the commonwealth of Virginia against the state of West Virginia, and which now threatens to cost the taxpayers of this state many millions of dollars. For the accomplishments of these ends, the co-operation of all patriotic citizens is, regardless of past or present party affiliation, most cordially invited, and their consummation in the event of democracy's success is in good faith promised. Rev. J. A. Gare Shipley has taken leave of his Marlinton charge as Pastor of the M. E. Church South, to resume Foreign Mission service in China. The valedictory services last Sabbath were of a very impressive character. It is not often a minister receives such manifestations of universal esteem as were accorded to the departed preacher in charge last Sabbath morning. All other services were suspended in the town and an immense audience assembled to hear his parting words. His request was, that all should remember that it was his heart's desire and prayer that whenever anyone thought of him to recall the words of the Redeemer: "In my Father's house are many mansions; if it were not so I would have told you: I go to prepare a place for you." John 14. Rev. C. W. Peyton, of the Presbyterian church, in some well chosen words expressed the sentiments, not only of the Presbyterian people, but what he felt sure were the sentiments of other church people and of the community in general. The services were concluded by singing the words: "My Heavenly home is bright and fair, nor pain nor death can enter there." For fifty years or more the writer has frequently heard that hymn sung, but never with more of "the spirit and understanding" than last Sabbath.
