"We believe that all nominations for public office, state and local should be made by general rrimary election, and pledge ourselves to the enactment and en forcement of such a law.

"We favor the establishment of a public service commission, having general supervision over the public service corporations of state. We declare for the asage of an adequate and just registration law, and condemn the present law as inadequate to protect the purity of the ballot.

"We condemn the republican party of the state of West Virginfor its incompetency and flaant neglect of a great public duty which has resulted in the suit of the commonwealth of Vir ginia against the state of West Virginia, and which now threatens to cost the taxpayers of this state many millions of dollars.

"For the accemplishments these ends, the co-operation of all patriotic eitizens is, regardless of past or present party affiliation, most cordially invited, and their consummation in the event of demoeracy's auccess is in good faith promised."
