There is much speculation as to who will be appointed to fill the vacancy on the County Court caused by the retirement of W. H. Hull, whose resignation will be acted upon by the Court next week. Robert Hickman, manager of the Company's store at Cass, seems to have the support of the Republican organization. He is exceptionally well qualified for the position, being a first-class business man, progressive, up-to-date, and possessed of remarkable executive ability. It will be remembered that he led the fight of the Scherr forces in the County Convention last year, winning out over the organization, and he afterward took a very prominent part in the convention at Charleston which nominated Scherr. On him, we think, it will not be difficult for the two factions of the Republican party, the Old Liners and the New Comers, to unite. On the other hand there is an unfounded rumor that the Court is inclined to appoint a Democrat, thus making the body bi-partisan. In that case J. W. Goodsell, Superintendent of the Tannery at Durbin, will probably be the man. His friends have already circulated petitions, asking his appointment, in Greenbank district, which are being signed by the citizens regardless of political affiliation. He is another busy man of large affairs, whose services as commissioner would be invaluable to the county. In the next few years a great deal of money will be expended on roads and bridges, and the experiences of the recent past show the necessity of a man skilled in dealing with contractors and buying materials in charge of the county's business. If the Court can bring itself to be so liberal minded as to appoint a Democrat, we cannot urge too strongly the consideration of Mr Goodsell.

The State won in the case of the three national banks of Charleston against the sheriff of Kanawha County July 19, when Judge Keller, of the Federal Court, sustained the defendants' demurrer, dissolved the temporary injunctions formerly granted by Judge Goff, and dismissed the plaintiffs' bill. The suits were brought to restrain the sheriff from collecting taxes for 1908 from the banks on the claim that the State law was in conflict with the Federal statutes, in that stockholders in banks were not allowed to deduct what they owe as principal debtor from bank stock as they are allowed to do with other moneys, stock, &c. The plaintiffs' bills were dismissed because they had failed to tender to the sheriff any part of the taxes. All the national banks in West Virginia were interested.

Virginia's "grand old man," Hon. John Goode of Bedford county, died in Norfolk July 14, aged 90 years. He served in two Constitutional Conventions (the last that of 1862), in the Secession Convention, in the Confederate army, in the Confederate Congress and the U. S. Congress. Virginia never had a more faithful son and servant and few of greater ability. His "Recollections of a Life Time" is a valuable historical and literary work. Mr Goode was U. S. Solicitor-General under President Cleveland. He is said to have been the last surviving member of the Confederate Congress.

In Fayette county, last week, 23 permits to run saloons were granted by the County Court, and eight applicants were refused. The Fayette Tribune says it meant \$63,000 to the State, and about \$500,000 to the Fayette Liquor Co.

The city of Staunton voted out the saloon by a majority of twenty in the selection last week. Two years ago the saloon won by twenty-four majority. A comparatively small vote was cast.
