Nearly 100 Miles to be Built at Once Along the Greenbrier Valley.

LINE

The project of constructing a ailroad along the Greenbrier River, West Virginia, through the extensive coal beds and timber tracts in the eastern section of West Virginia was detailed over a year ago in the Manufacturer's Record. The company, comprising several prominent Northern capitalists, took up the matter, and several surveys were made, but for a time the matter was held in abeyance. The Manufacturer's Record has been informed upon the highest authority that arrangements have finally been made to construct this road, which will extend from Caldwell station, on the Chesapeake & Ohio to the forks of Greenbrier, a distance of ninety miles. In connection with the railroad a large pulp mill will be built, as recently stated in these columns. Surveys are now being made for the railroad, and the promoting company expects to let contacts within the next thirty days. The route is through a section of West Virginia which is practically


