CHANGE OF PRECINCT LINES

LITTLE LEVELS DISTRICT- PRECINCT NO. 4

At a Regular Term of the County continued and held at the Court House of said County, on the 1st day of March, 1910, it appearing to the Court that it is necessary to divide the Precinct No 1 in Little Levels district, and it appearing to the Court that public convenience and public good requires two more voting precincts in said district, it is therefore ordered that Precinct No. 4 of said district be established as follows:

Beginning at a point on the line between the Huntersville District and the Little Levels District at the Greenbrier River; thence down said River to the Beaver Creek Ford; thence with the Beaver creek road on the West side of the river to the forks of the same near H. H. Thomas; thence with road leading to Smith's Mill to the railroad; thence down the railroad to the crossing at the old Ike Smith road, it being a corner of the corporation of Seebert; thence up said road to where the same strikes the line of the lands of Isaac Jackson; thence around said farm so as to throw same to the Precinct of Seebert; thence with the Seebert and Hillsboro road to the top of the hill where the lane leads off to John L. Kinnison's; thence with the road leading from said Kinnison to K. O. Wade's; thence to the line of the lands of Henry McCoy; thence around the lines of the said Henry McCoy so as to throw the said Henry McCoy in the precinct of Seebert; thence to the line of T. A. Sydenstricker on top of the river ridge; thence a straight line to the railroad crossing at Burn-sides; thence down the railroad to the culvert across Mill Run; thence an easterly direction across Greenbrier River a straight line to the forks of Laurel Run at Allen Coulter's place; thence with the County Road to the summit of the divide between Spice and Laurel Run; thence an easterly course with said divide to the district line; thence with said district line to the beginning. The voting place in said precinct shall be the school house in the village of Seebert.

PRECINCT NO. 7
Beginning at the railroad bridge below Gertrude; thence west to the Pocahontas and Randolph line and with said County line in a north-easterly direction around so as to run a due west line back to the beginning.
The voting place in said precinct shall be at Widdell.

PRECINCT NO. 8
Beginning at railroad bridge below Gertrude; thence west to the Pocahontas and Randolph County line; thence southwest with said county line to where the Staunton & Parkersburg Turnpike crosses the top of the mountain; thence in a north-easterly direction so as to throw Bob Kerr's place to the Durbin precinct to a point on the C. & L. Railroad one mile above Braucher; thence east to the top of the mountain that divides the waters of the East Fork from the waters of Little River; thence north to the county line between Randolph and Pocahontas and with said county line in a northwesterly direction and with line of Precinct No. 7 to the beginning.
The place of voting shall be at Barner.

EDRAY DISTRICT

Beginning at the point where the Greenbank Road intersects the Staunton & Parkersburg Turnpike and with the Staunton & Parkersburg Turnpike to the Virginia line; thence with the said line in a southerly course to the top of Bear Mountain; thence a straight line to Buffalo Mountain road south of Perry Tracy's residence so as to include the said Perry Tracy in the Boyer Precinct; thence a straight line to the ford at Marion Ray's near Uriah Hevener's gate; thence with the line between the lands of Uriah Hevener and Samuel B. Railroad one mile above Braucher; thence east to the top of the mountain that divides the waters of the East Fork from the waters of Little River; thence north to the county line between Randolph and Pocahontas and with said county line in a northwesterly direction and with line of Precinct No. 7 to the beginning.
