#### THE FOREST LAW

At the last regular session of the protection of the forests of the State were passed. Advance copies of the law may be had by applying to office of the State Game, Fish and Forest Warden, J. A. Viques iev, at Baington The important provisions of the

law are as follows: The State Game Warden shall be ex-officio State fire warden, and shall appoint some suitable person as a State forester, whose duty it shall be to formulate plans for refores ing t e cuto er and der uded land, to prevent forest destruction by fire, administering the forest lands of the state on forestry principles, instructing and encouraging private owners in preserving the young and growing timber for commercial purposes, establishing and maintaining patrol routes and lookout stations and securing the aid and cooperation of individuals, companies, organizations and the federal government in the preservation of the forests of the state.

All deputy game wardens to be deputy fire wardens of their county and shall have jurisdiction in ad joining counties when necessary.

The State warden shall appoint special deputies and inspectors to meet the provisions of the federal law in securing federal cooperation under the Weeks law, and may appoint special wardens for each

In case of fire the deputy wardens shall attend and use all necessary means to confine and extinguish the fire. He may destroy fences plow land and in an emergency set back fires. He may hire volunteers or summon any resident of his county to assist in putting out fires. Any person summoned who is physically able, and refuses to assist shall be guilty of misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not less than is, the man who married bareten nor more than fifty dollars, and may be confined in jail not erty. over sixty days.
