JUDGE KELLER
By Hon. William Gordon Mathews.

I believe that it is seldom, if ever, that a message of greater sadness has come to the bar, to the citizens and to the people of the Southern District of West Virginia, than that bearing the not unexpected news of the passing of Judge Keller, on yesterday morning.

I feel, as I know the members of the bar feel, that with him passed a judge who, without flattery, might well be termed one of the great nisi prius judges of America. But it is not, for the moment, of him as a judge, able, learned, competent, courteous, as he always was, that I feel the blow which has fallen. To me, and to those of us who saw such of Judge Keller, in Charleston, it is Keller, the man with the kind smile, with the warm hand clasp, with the ever present and unflinching interest which he took in his friends, in people, and things, who has passed from us forever, leaving behind, it is true, a memory that is and always will be fragrant; but the human grasp of his hand, the smile of his lips are gone, and we have left only such inspiration as we may derive from his life and his services to us and to the state, largely rendered in this court room.

Just as I came to this meeting, my attention was called to a newspaper clipping as to certain services held in memory of the late Chief Justice Wiswell, of Maine, and the opening sentence was so impressive to me, that I desire to read it:

"At times we are strikingly reminded that close beside the borders of life, set with all its blooms, flows the river of death, into whose forbidding waters no man may step and then return, and no man who has once entered, may send answer back from the further shore.

"When it comes to one who is frail with sickness or weary with the hardships of life, the fingers of death are soft and even welcome, but when it overtakes, as it did here, the strong man in harness, it must give us pause in order that we may cast a glance at the life, at the character, at the career of him who has left us."

Mr. President, both of the alternatives suggested in that quotation, are applicable to Judge Keller.

The blow which resulted ultimately in his death, fell upon him when he was actively and vigorously in the harness, possessed, apparently with every qualification, physical and mental, for long and useful service, discharging smoothly and faithfully, the judicial work for which he was so well adapted, and upon him, while there in the harness, fell the blow. After eighteen months of suffering, of pain, and what must have been, I am bold, great physical anguish, came death, and I cannot but believe, as I know we all hope, that when it came, he found his fingers warm and tender and welcome, and relieving him from that long waiting, for the call for which he had come more nearly to express impatience, than perhaps he ever did about anything in his life.

I agree thoroughly with what Mr. Price has said, and measuring my words and speaking deliberately, it is my belief, that I never had the privilege of appearing before a more able nisi prius judge, in or out of the State of West Virginia, or in my opinion, one who was so well equipped as was Judge Keller.

He had, in the highest degree, that vague thing which is termed judicial temperament, probably more properly termed poise.

Judge Keller could not be rushed off his feet, by the reasonings or arguments of counsel even when backed up by an array of citations until he had digested and analyzed them all, and reached his own independent conclusions. He seemed to have an almost uncanny ability to get right at the heart of things, to strike the determinative factor, when everybody else seemed hopelessly at sea.

Even with his increasing deafness, which afflicted him to some extent, from the time that he first went on the bench, perhaps on account of this handicap, which he fully recognized, he did, I am sure more preparatory work, than any trial judge that I have ever known.

I have been struck, over and over again, at the opening of a case, with the marked familiarity which he would display as to the written technical issues which were presented and involved, perhaps by a dozen or twenty special pleas filed, and it would be perfectly manifest, that he had read and was thoroughly conversant with every paper connected with the case, and had read and studied, with the most painstaking care, everything that was written or printed in connection with it, pleadings, depositions, affidavits and exhibits, so that, from the commencement of the suit to its conclusion, there would be no issue that would be a surprise to Judge Keller. In the development and progress of the case; and when a point arose upon those issues, or upon the admissibility of any testimony or of any deposition, he would always seem to me, be ready to rule instantly, and to have the authorities and the reasons which demonstrated the correctness of his ruling, at his fingers end.

It has never been my experience to know a judge who occupied the bench as long as Judge Keller, who discharged the strenuous duties of his office during the same period, who was fortunate as to be so absolutely and entirely free from any shadow of sinister criticism.

I do not think the man lives in West Virginia, who ever thought, or ever said, that Judge Keller, in any of his decisions, or actions as a judge, was or could be governed by anything except his desire to decide a case according to the law and the evidence.

I have never heard criticism of Judge Keller, as unfortunately, I have heard of so many judges, as to the motives that actuated him, or his being susceptible to any outside influence or power, political or other wise; and it seems to me, that for him to have occupied the position he did with the bitter controversies that he had before him during the whole of that time as he had, and to have

escaped even the breath of that sinister, character of criticism, is perhaps, the highest tribute to his memory which could be added.

I feel, speaking for myself, and I know for everyone who came in contact, with any degree of intimacy, with Judge Keller, that we have lost one of the great judges of our country; that our state has suffered irreparable loss; and that the Federal Judiciary of our Nation has suffered a loss which it can with difficulty if at all, wholly repair.

I believe that could Judge Keller, before his calling came, and before he left us, have summoned before him in this court room, that vast concourse of litigants, whose cases he had heard, tried and determined, and the lawyers who had tried those cases before him, and asked of them, as did Samuel of old, "Who is there that has stood before me to whom I have not striven to do equal and exact justice," that not one voice in that vast concourse but what would have joined in the reply made by the Hebrew people to the Royal Judge of Israel, "There is no such man."

Samuel Howard, of Richwood, was in Pocahontas last week for the purpose of stirring up some interest in the matter of opening up the old Pocahontas and Nicholas Turnpike from Hillsboro to Richwood. A. L. Craig, the real estate man, of Richwood, raised the sum of \$500. In his town to open the road on the Nicholas County side. The work has been completed to Dogway to about two miles from the Fallen Timber. From this point to Lobelia is a distance of eight or ten miles, a part of the way being a side road and the rest but a bridled path. Mr. Howard reports the old pike on a good grade, and it can be made a passable highway for automobiles by cutting out the down timber, slashing and brush. This road will put Marlinton about twenty miles nearer to Richwood than by the present route to Renick and over the Coal Knob. The grade is also much easier.

Unlawful to let stock run at large in any public road.

Section 3. If any horses, mules, asses, jennets, cattle, sheep, hogs, goats shall enter into any grounds enclosed by a lawful fence, the owner or manager of such animal shall be liable to the owner of such grounds for any damage he may sustain thereby.
