Charleston .- Dr. J. M. Williamson treasurer of the State Board of Control, resigned his position on the board several months ago and does not seek reappointment, according to a statement made by Governor John J. Corn-1. Dr. Williamson was formerly mayor of Moundsville, and was appointed by Governor Hatfield in 1913. His sucgovernor.

Charleston .- Attorney General E. T. England said that he and associate counsel will appear before the United States Supreme Court at Washington to present briefs and petitions in the two cases in which Pennsylvania and Ohio are to ask that the Steptoe law, passed by the West Virginia Legislature, requiring gas companies to furnish consumers in the state with gas before piping it outside, be declared unconstitutional.

Charleston.-The total value of all high school property in West Virginia at the beginning of the present school year was \$7,984,152, according to the annual report of L. L. Friend, state supervisor of high schools, this repre senting an increase of nearly \$500,000 more than the previous year. The cost of maintaining these schools during the period was \$5,182,472, of which \$938,547 was expended in salaries to 1,015 teachers, of whom 334 were mer and 681 women. The per capita cost of high school education in the state last year, based on a total eprollment of 16,168, was \$73.13. Of the total enrollment 6,559 were boys and 9,609

Charleston .- Between \$200,000 and \$350,000 a day will be added to the cost of running the mines in Northern West Virginia alone, under the 14 per cent increase, according to figures compiled by the Northern West Virginia Coal Operators' Association. The increase, which sounds small, will entall a heavy expense on all operations which is not apparent at first. It means, it is estimated, that the addi tional expense to coal operators in Northern West Virginia alone, because of the fourteen per cent increase, will reach from \$8,000,000 to \$9,000,000 a year over and above present expenses, none of which can, of course, be added to the price of coal.

Morgantown.-Representatives of 39 counties of West Virginia voted here to affiliate the West Virginia Federation of Farm Bureau with the American Bureau Federation. The counties represented were: Brooke, Grant, Dodridge, Wood, Marshall, Lincoln, Summers, Webster, Pocahontas, Randolph, Kanawha, Hardy, Marien, Morgan, Braxton, Greenbrier, Ritchie Monroe, Jackson, Taylor, Hampshire, Wayne, Mineral, Pleasants, Ohio, Roan, Jefferson, Barbour, Gilmer, Ber keley, Upshue, Lewis, Putnam, Mercer Raieigh, Monongalia, Harrison and Hancock.
