John T. Bear

In the death of John Trimble Bear on Sunday, November 20, 1932, the Churchville community lost one of its oldest and best known citizens. While his health had been failing for the last year, it was only about a month ago that the symptoms suddenly became alarming, and about two weeks ago he became confined to his bed.

A member of a well known and highly respected family, he was a son of Christian Bear and his wife Margaret Trimble. He was born April 23, 1852, and was therefore 77 years, 6 months and 28 days old.

In 1888 he married Miss Fannie Martin, a member of New Providence Church, who with the following children survive: James Martin, of Marlinton; Albert Christian, of Churchville; Margaret Elizabeth Taliferro, of Cranford, N. J.; John Trimble Bear, Jr., of Marlinton; Rev. Henry Hoover, of Charlotte, N. C.

He was the last member of his family of that generation and was one of six children: William Bear who went into the civil war at its opening and was captured at Phillipi, and died after a year in prison on the Ohio River; Ephraim Baxter Bear, of Churchville; Rev. James E. a missionary to China; Mrs. Rattie, wife of Rev. Daniel Wilson, of Bristol, and Mary Elizabeth, wife of H. K. Dunlap, of Rockbridge.

A son of Christian parents, he was always of a religious nature and was greatly interested in his church. He became a member of Loch Willow Presbyterian church in early youth and was elected to the eldership in 1886. He became clerk of the session in 1898, thirty four years ago. His book was well kept and was often commended by Lexington Presbytery.

For many years he and his wife drove every Sunday afternoon to Buffalo Gap, six miles away, and conducted a Sunday school. Out of that work has grown the Buffalo Gap Presbyterian church.

Mr. Bear was a magistrate for fifteen years or more, and his decisions were well thought of. He had also conducted a flour mill at Churchville, and was prominent in the affairs of the community. He will be greatly missed both in the church and community.

Funeral services held Tuesday from Loch Willow church, conducted by his pastor Rev. W. C. White. Burial in Green Hill cemetery—Staunton Leader.

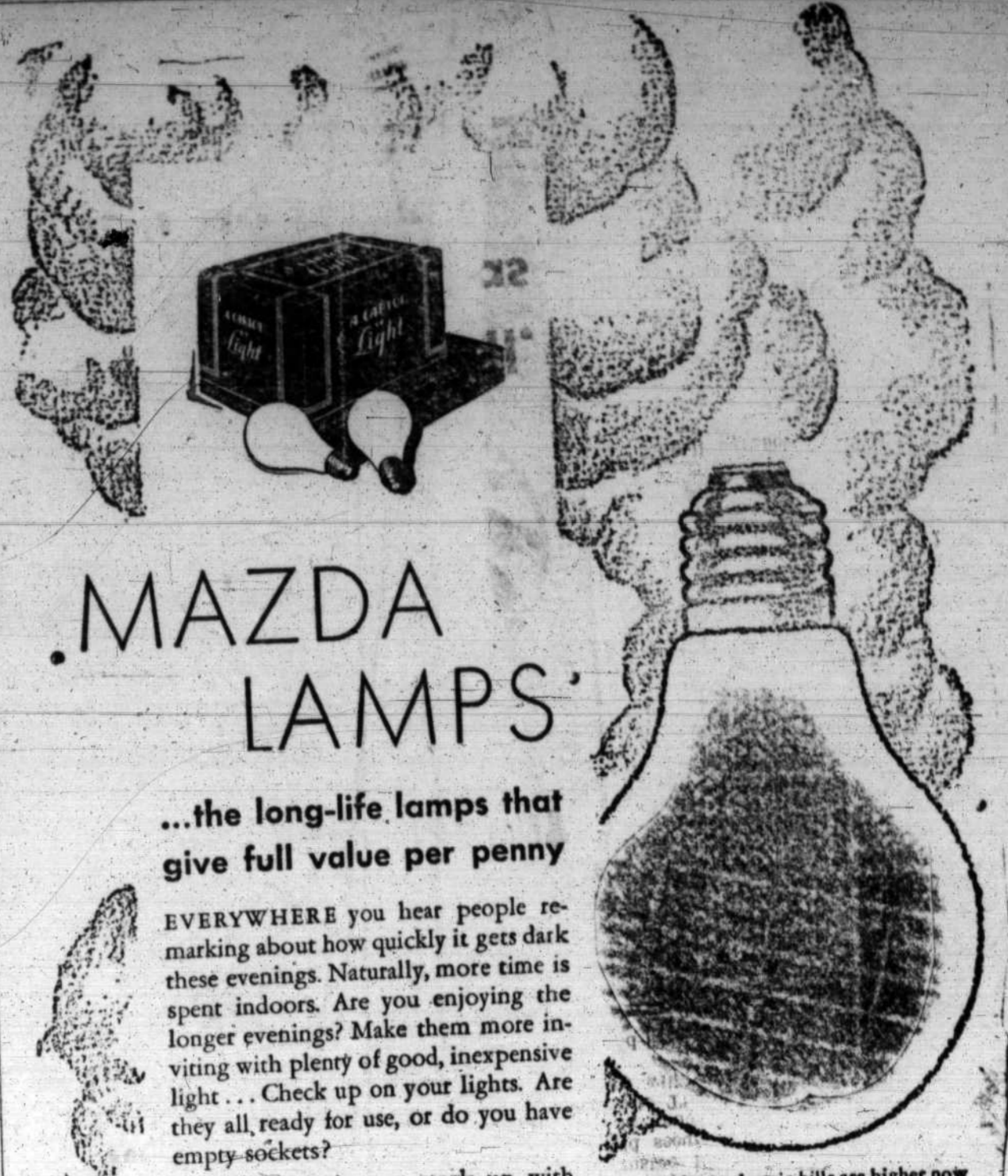
