FOAGE-DAVIES ALLIANCE

The Foage Davies alliance has been of great interest to me lately. Also the Michael Woods and Mary Campbell marriage that turned out so well. Here before me I have a communication from a skilled genealogist in Kansas City, Missouri, who accepts no tradition without first dissecting its entire frame for flaws.

He wrote me to know what or where the authority was for claiming the wife of Michael Woods was of the family of the Duke of Argyle and was allowed to be called "Lady"; I had seen it a good many places and knew also that a lot of tradition creeps in family history.

I sent him all the references I had; most of which I had secured from a great lady here in our city, the great granddaughter of William Woods, brother of Martha Woods Wallace. She came from Woodford County, Kentucky; that rich blue grass section dear to the hearts of Kentucky aristocrats.

Mr. Cooper, the man above referred to, sent me the following: Sir Archibald Campbell, 9th Earl of Argyle, born February 26th, 1628-9. He was restored to the estates of his fathers in 1663; his father, the eighth Earl, having been executed for political reasons at Edinburgh.

He refused to subscribe to the test act, requiring all citizens to acknowledge the King as head of the Church, and to pray for the King as such. After the affray at Bothwell bridge, in 1679, and the Duke of Monmouth's rebellion, he was found guilty of treason December 19, 1681 and was sentenced to death.

He escaped disguised as a page attending his niece and left the Kingdom. He was later taken in an abortive attempt to invade Scotland and was executed in the same way as his father, June 30, 1685.

He married first, Mary daughter of James 4th, Earl of Moray, May 15, 1650. She died May 10, 1668. He married January 28, 1670 Anne, second daughter of Colonel McKenzie, last Earl of Seaforth, widow of Alexander first Earl of Burray. She also suffered imprisonment on the rumor of her husband's invasion of Scotland. She died May 2nd and was buried May 29, 1707. No children given of this marriage.

The Duke of Argyle either went to Ireland or Holland when he escaped. The latter possibly as this was a certain refuge. Authorities state further he left the kingdom. This, I believe, to mean he left the English domain.

The 9th Duke had by his first wife, Mary and a son James. This son had a daughter Mary, who transferred her estates to a Fairfax. This is said to have been the Lady Mary Campbell who married Michael Woods and came to Virginia by way of Pennsylvania. Lady Mary Campbell was born 1688, fourteen years later than her husband.

Now for the Porges. The other day the Times carried a little paragraph about one of those young Ark buckle cousins taking up the ministry. Only recently Footes Sketches, second series, was given me by my aunt. In the front was a nice clear engraving of our grand sire many generations removed, Rev. Samuel Davies. How proud I am of that noted man's work and his part in establishing the Presbyterian church in Virginia, and Princeton College in New Jersey. With bated breath I have listened for years to the tales of that noted divine, Jonathan Edwards. DD, his children and his children's children.

It was he who succeeded Rev. Aaron Burr (Edwards's son in law) for only a few short weeks as president of Princeton. Our illustrious ancestor had refused the position. Dr. Davies found his congregation in Hanover county, Virginia, more interesting and to his taste, with his dearest "Chara" and his young children.

Being registrar of a great D A R Chapter, numbering several hundred, has its compensation. Some time ago I came on papers of a member, descendant of Gen. John Poage, who fought at Yorktown. This lady who had the D A R descent from Gen. Poage, claims her great grandfather, Allen Poage, carried the Foage Bible to Kentucky—at least he had a Bible in Kentucky with these dates and names:

Col Robert Poage, born 1752, married Mary Hopkins.  
Col George Poage, born March 28, 1754, married Anne Allen.  
Col William Poage, born March 17, 1756, married Margaret Davies.  
John Poage, born Dec 23, 1757.  
Elizabeth Poage married Moses Hoge; she died June 18, 1802.  
Col James Poage, born March 17, 1760, married Mary Woods.  
Anne Hoge married Andrew Kinkead.

Rev. Thomas Poage died in October 1793, only a few months after he married Laura Watkins.

"These above Colonels all fought in the Revolution," so says this ancestral chart. Gen. John Poage had been Captain of Augusta County, Virginia Militia many years; also Justice of the Peace. When the war came on, captain and representative of the several companies and officers holders of Augusta who signed October 1, 1776 statements of sentiment in which they declared our independence of Great Britain and every other Nation. We are determined upon it. Qualified as high sheriff, March 17, 1778.

KEEP RECORDS

Qualified as surveyor, March 18, 1778, of Augusta county, Virginia. A certified copy of Gen. John Poage's cognation is attached to National number, Society Daughters American Revolution, No. 9435, a very early paper.

The paper says further, Gen. John Poage married Mary Blair, who died 1793—they were married June 3, 1751. Gen. Poage was born 1726 and died 1789.

Mary Blair, I believe, was a sister or daughter of Samuel of John Blair, of Pennsylvania. She died of grief, living only a few short weeks after her youngest son, Rev. Thomas Poage, died. Elizabeth Poage Hoge called her sons James Poage, John Blair, and Samuel Davies.

Col William Poage, born 1756 and fought in the Revolution. He married Margaret Davies, said to have been born in 1743. This is a mistake; she probably was born in 1753 instead. It isn't probable that Col Poage would have married a woman thirteen years his senior.

She was, I am convinced, the daughter of Rev. Samuel Davies, who was born of pure Welsh ancestry near Summit Ridge, about twelve miles from Dalmeyer Church, New Castle county, Delaware, on November 3, 1723.

He was a much beloved child, coming late in his parents' lives. What he lacked in health he made up in energy and brains. His mother is praised as is his father by Dr. Foote, but his numerous mention of Mrs. Davies, refers to her as the "mother" of Dr. Davies. He wrote Dr. Gibbons in London, praising his "nephew's" mother. Early in life Samuel Davies was placed under the tutelage of his parents fellow Countryman, Rev. Morgan, a noted Welsh minister. He finished his education at Fagus Manor Chester county, Pennsylvania, under the noted Rev. Samuel Blair, on July 31, 1746; he was ordained to preach at the New Castle Presbytery. His health had become so undermined by his close application to his studies he was in a very melancholy state from ungodly affection. This weakened state became much worse after the hardships, incident to his going to Virginia as a missionary.

He lost his first wife about this time. She was Miss Sarah Kirkpatrick, whom he married October 23rd, 1746. She died Sept. 15th, 1747, together with a Baby Son. This is recorded in Rev. Davies own writing, says Dr. Foote, in the former's Bible (Now owned 1850) by descendent in Peterstown, Virginia.

For a season after this he was dangerously ill for months. Some time afterward his health improved and he again attempted the work of Virginia. Very little is given in regard to his family except his wife whom he repeatedly referred to as dearest Chara. She was his second wife, her name was Miss Jane Holt, whom he married Oct. 4, 1748. She was a native of Hanover county, Virginia.

In 1753, when he went to England and Scotland to raise funds for Nassau Hall or the College at Princeton, N. J. he speaks of his dearest "Chara" and my three Innocent Children. Billy and Johnny have been ill but are gaining rapidly. His trip was a three weeks ordeal from Philadelphia to Liverpool, England. He says the seamen were the most brutal talking persons that he ever met. An older Minister
