I have in hand a most comprehensive table prepared by State Tax Commissioner, Fred Fox, showing taxes levied on classified assessed val uation of real estate, personal prop' erty and public utility property for 1933, and total taxes levied for the year 1932, with decrease and percent age of same:

The real estate of West Virginia was charged with taxes to the amount of \$22,964 622 in 1932; in 1933; the charges were \$13,247.089; a saving of \$9,717, 533; a cub of over 41 percent. For Pocahontas county reale the 1932 figures are \$134,469, and for 1933, \$49,235; a saving of \$85,234; of over 63 percent.

In 1932, the personal property of the state was charged with \$6 170,502 taxes; in 1933, \$3,666,103; a saving of \$2,504.399, or over 40 percent. For Pocahontas county, the 1932 figures are \$53,827, and for 1933, only \$18, 912; a saving of \$24,915, or nearly 65 percent

In 1932, the public utility proper ty of the state was charged with \$14.711.276 in taxes: in 1933, \$10, 298,581; a saving of \$4,412,695 or 30 percent. For public utilities in Pocahontas county, the figures are \$82. 064: for 1933, \$46,53, a saving of \$35,561, or over 43 percent.

The grand total of all property in the state shows figures for 4932 taxes of \$43,846,400; for 1933 taxes of \$27, 211,773, a decrease of \$16,634,627. or nearly 38 percent. In Pocahontas. the total tax for 1932 was \$270,360; in 1933, \$114,650, a saving of \$155,-710, or over 57 percent.
