The exhibition will be in Unit B of the Administration Building. However, the most recent information concerning the availability of the newly renovated section of the building is that it will not be available for two weeks.

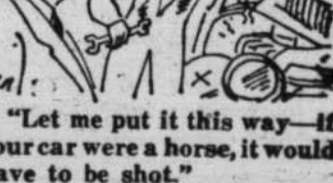
Therefore, plans for an opening date are not definite.
