It was located on a flat piece of ground at the foot of Middle mountain. The water stood about two feet from the surface, and was never known to get higher or lower. Around it was a favorite place for cattle to lie down, and although water was scarce in that immediate locality and the hole never fenced or otherwise enclosed, stock were never known to approach it to drink. It is located but a short distance from the public road, and strangers who had seen an account of it in Holmes' History of Virginia or heard of it from other sources, often stopped in the road and visited this pool of water. A few days ago Mr. Wm. A. Varner, who lives on the farm, was passing by to salt his cattle and discovered that the earth had fallen in around it, the water all gone and the hole filled up to within about 15 or 20 feet of the top and so dry that the earth at the bottom was cracked. 
