RAILROAD MATTERS.

The work of securing the right of way from Marlinton to Whitcomb has been going on steadily and every indication points to a railroad up the river at an early date, but everything in this world is subject to change, and this is especially true of the plans of railroad promoters.

About \$2500 has already been subscribed to reimburse Colonel McGraw on the right of way purchase in Edray and Levels districts. Colonel McGraw was in peculiar position evidently when he made the proposition to give the right of way. He had to act quickly and there was no time to communicate with land owners here. A weaker man might have hesitated but he acted in a decisive manner and the people of the Greenbrier valley should appreciate the service and be just enough to see that he loses nothing by it. Such action would go farther with the writer than if the question had been directly saddled on the people of the valley, making the railroad contingent upon the gift of the right of way.

Mr Hankins, engineer in charge, and some of his staff are in Marlinton at Bird's Hotel, and it is rumored that this may become headquarters. The camp outfit was hauled from Little Back Creek and stored in the temporary court-house Tuesday.

Uriah Bird has been taking new contracts from the landowners below Marlinton and secured very material reductions. J. W. Beard, whose farm land is injured by the road to the extent of 23 acres, has closed a contract. Allan Kinnison who gets the benefit of 1 1/2 miles of the track, as well as having the line projected through his house, suffers the greatest damage. The price has not been agreed upon in this case. The Apperson right of way will be settled out of court it is thought.

Col McGraw has complied with the terms and the contract bringing the road up the river has been signed.

We have good reason to believe that if the road is built up the Greenbrier that it will be but a matter of a very short time until a road is built from the mouth of Sittlington's Creek over the Rider Gap to the Hot Springs route.

THE BANK OF MARLINTON.

The Bank of Marlinton will be open for business this week. F. R. Hunter, late teller of the Bank of Greenbrier, is the cashier. M. J. McNeel of Academy is the president of the bank. He is known as one of the safest and most conservative business men of the county. The company bought a lot near the east end of the bridge and erected a building thereon. A fine safe with a time lock has been put in and the rooms neatly furnished.

The stock is all held by Greenbrier and Pocahontas people, some of the wealthiest men of both counties being identified with the enterprise. One-half the stock is placed in Greenbrier and the rest in Pocahontas. The expected railroad development is the cause of the bank being established here, but its continuance does not depend upon a railroad by any means. While it will not be so convenient doing a banking business this distance from a railroad, the company considers it a good field in either event. It is reported in banking circles that no less than eight companies in Virginia, West Virginia, and Ohio were contemplating starting a bank at this place. A bank here has been badly needed in this county for years, and it will be a great convenience to the people generally. Pocahontas welcomes the new enterprise and hopes that it is but the first of many investments of capital in the development of this county.

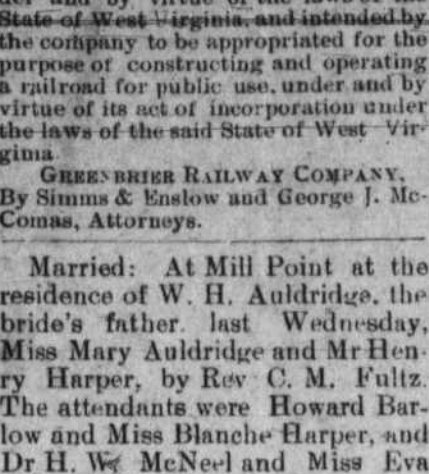

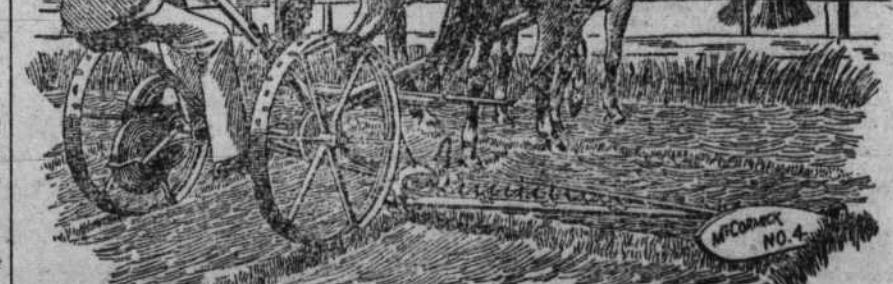
