For seventy years he has been a practicing physician in this county. He has also taught school, made shoes and worked as a farmer. In the main he compounded his own medicines from the native herbs. In no small measure he accounts for his remarkable health to his habits of daily out door exercise. Only one day last winter was he housed up by the very deep snow. As a young man he was often employed by the late James A. Price in harvesting hay on the present site of the town of Marlinton.

The Doctor is cutting a new set of teeth, has a new coat of hair growing, and is enjoying his second eye sight. In his prime he was a crack rifle shot, winning many shooting matches, and has killed moose game. So far as he has kept account he has a hundred deer to his credit, a half dozen bears, and thousands of squirrels.
