HUNTERSVILLE SCHOOL

Some time before school commenced it was predicted that the school here this year would be very small, even smaller than last year. Of course we came with the expectation of having a small school, but at 9 o'clock a. m. of September 29, when school opened we had changed our minds. The enrollment the first day exceeded the total enrollment of last year. Following is a report of the first month ending October 24:

Primary and Intermediate Grades—Miss Dora Kincaid, teacher. Number enrolled 20. Those neither absent nor tardy, Earl and Mearle Guth, Amber Cole, Anna Price Sheets, Hubert Guth, Upper Grades and High School, Luther Flynn, teacher. Enrollment 18. Percent of daily attendance; boys 92; girls 98. Those neither absent nor tardy, Lucile Care, Icie Myers, Mamie White, Opal McComb, Daggy White: six were absent one half day each, five one half day each and three more than one day. This is a very good record, but why not make a better one next month.

We are pleased to note that the parents seem to take an interest in the school. Not only the parents of Huntersville but of different parts of the district. As a proof of their interest we have enrolled in the school eight pupils from different parts of the district. Some are driving as far as four miles every evening and morning. This shows not only their interest in education but that they are awake to every opportunity afforded them for advancement. We also believe that these people who are in school here are not here solely for the purpose of having a good time but to get what a school should give them. They are beginning to work with an earnestness which shows that they mean business.

Some High School work has been done here for some time. Before this school year opened the Board of Education said that one full year or as much as was thought best, of High school work should be given. This year we have systemized our high school work and four students are taking the regular first year's work, while several others are taking from one to three branches. Of course we cannot give as complete a course as a regular high school where they have time, space and equipment, of which we have neither in sufficient amount. We are however, I believe, doing some good work. It is to be hoped that Huntersville will soon have a good high school so that the young people of this district can get a good high school education without going to some other district or county where they have to pay both board and tuition. There is plenty of material here for a high school. Why not have one?

We would say to the parents, give us your hearty cooperation and thus help to make this school one of the best in the county. One way that you can help us a great deal is to make an effort to have your children in school every day and on time. We would like to see as many names on the honor roll from here this year as possible. Being tardy as well as absent will prevent the children's names from appearing on the honor roll. Not only this but when they come in late they disturb others as well as themselves. Come in and see us at work, and see what we are trying to do. We will be glad to have you visit us at any time.

The teachers' district institute was held at Academy Friday October 31. The institute was called to order by our county superintendent B. B. Williams. After devotional exercises conducted by Rev. Johnson, the following topics were taken up in the order given:

1. The grading of one-teacher schools, by Miss Overholt. Miss Overholt's talk was mainly along the line of the necessity of keeping the one-room school graded to do effective teaching.

2. A library in every country school, by Blaine Engle. The speaker tried to suggest some ways of getting a library; to tell what constituted a proper library; how to make use of it; and how to attract boys and girls to the library and train them in the reading habit.

3. The "Social Center" Idea by Mr. Grimes. Mr. Grimes contrasted the old and the new methods of social activity and showed the tendency today was towards selfishness, greed for the dollar,

and painted in particular the need of a social center and proved that this center could be easily made the rural school.

First, in afternoon Mr. Rohr presented ten good points from O'Shea's Everyday Problems in Teaching, followed by Mr. Hume who on account of cold talked briefly but to the point upon Teachers Reading Circle work. Mr. Anderson spoke upon sanitation, drinking cups for each school and a cabinet to place them in, elimination of the public towel, and an unceasing fight upon physical indecent and morally inexcusable rural school privy were some of the ideas brought out and for which all the teachers agreed to stand. Fourth and last for the evening was the teaching a class the story of a piece of coal by Miss Merrells. A method of calling the class and how to conduct the recitation as well as to bring out the thought of the lesson was clearly shown.

The main topics after being discussed by the person to whom they were assigned were then thrown open for general discussion. Much good was derived from these general discussions as it gave each teacher a chance to present some particular idea or phase of the subject not already brought out. The meeting was not as well attended by the teachers of the district as it should have been. However much good was derived from the institute and the writer only wishes that more might be had.
