JAIL DELIVERY

Five prisoners broke out of the Pocahontas County jail last night, Wednesday. They were Ed Lyons, under sentence for burglary; Dick Long, for selling whiskey; Lloyd Long, for insubordination at the reform school; Romeo, an Italian, charged with burning a building at Cass; and Russell Rhoads, charged with forgery.

Lyons cut a hole in his cell and opened the doors of the other cells with the lever which had been left unlocked. They then took their blankets, prized a hole through the ceiling, and went through the hole in the roof cut some months ago by Lyons in his former escape. Sheriff Cochran is away from home at this time. Three other prisoners refused to go. Lyons had evidently been working on his cell for some months. He had two back saws and other tools, and would work at night and fill the cut places with soap. He and Rhoads broke jail with several others last spring. Lyons was then captured in Cumberland and Rhoads in Richwood.

Lloyd Long was captured at Stilton this morning by Edgar Cochran. Long was standing behind a tree near the railway track and Mr. Cochran saw him from the train. Around the next curve he had the train stopped and he went back and met Long coming up the track.

HOUSE WARMING

The opening of the clubhouse of the Allegheny Sportsmen's Association at Minnehaha Springs last week could not well have been more auspicious. The occasion was the seventh annual meeting of the West Virginia Forest, Fish and Game Protective Association. Some forty odd members from out of the county were in attendance, and on Thursday night more than three hundred persons gathered in the big lobby of the clubhouse before the large open fire place to hear the speeches and listen to the fine music by the Marlinton Orchestra.

Among those who addressed the association were the Rev. Dr. Hammond, of St. Marys; Hon. J. A. Viquesney, of Belington; Hon. A. D. Williams, of Morgantown; Dr. T. S. Palmer, of Washington, D. Elmer Poage, of Edray, has handled five thousand lambs, mainly from Edray district this season. The average weight was over 75 pounds each and the average price was more than five cents a pound. The last bunch of lambs was bought of A. L. Dilley, of Dilley's Mill, 23 lambs weighing 2,430 pounds. Last year Mr. Poage sold George Gay fourteen head of ewes. The increase from this flock was sold for \$80, and the ewes brought fifty cents more on the head than he paid for them. Mr. Poage says that where there were five light lambs, that is under 60 pounds, last year, there is not one this season, and the lambs taken up average from three to five pounds heavier than last year.
