Both this pool and the health giving waters of Minnehaha Spring are now the exclusive property of the Minnehaha Springs Improvement Co., as they were originally the property of Dr. J. B. Lockridge, the promoter of this movement.

The hill on which the hotel stands is brilliantly lighted with electricity from the house plant, which makes it a shining landmark for all the surrounding neighborhood and a beautiful sight to one coming into the valley at night, from any direction. The hotel and bath house also, are profusely illuminated and the wide verandas, under the glow of the electric lights, make a choice lounging place in the cool of the evening.

The water of Minnehaha Spring is piped to a reservoir and distributed to all the rooms of the hotel by natural pressure; the pumping plant is operated by an electric motor from the private plant which lights the hotel and grounds. That water has a strong beneficial effect on its users as well attested by many who have used it, while no more delightful water for drinking purposes can be found, and the guests and management are confident of the future of this charming place—which the success of even this short season fully justifies—when it becomes better known to the traveling public.
