COUNTY COURT

The county court was in session Tuesday and Wednesday. The main work of the session was the preparation of the estimate for the levy, which is published elsewhere in this paper. One and two-third cents was taken from the county fund, which was fixed at fifteen cents; heretofore sixteen and two-third cents. Road and bridge levies remain the same as last year.

A large delegation of citizens from Clover Lick and Poage Lane were in attendance at court, asking for general improvement in road conditions in that neighborhood. It is to be hoped that this agitation will result in some good. The heavy rains of this season have demonstrated the hopelessness of trying to maintain good earth roads in the limestone and bluegrass section west of the river. Most of the progressive people of this part have become converted to the macadam system of road improvement. Under the present system the building of macadam road is necessarily slow. It is possible that the people of the county and district will see the advisability of a moderate bond issue for permanent road improvement during the next few years. J. H. McClintic and J. W. Hill appointed to make annual settlement with the sheriff.

The grand total of claims for sheep killed by dogs for the year was 147, of an aggregate value of \$950. This is an exceedingly bad showing for the county. The number of worthless, ownerless, sheepkilling dogs in this county is a disgrace to a peaceful sheep-raising community. Apparently the sheep raisers of the county will be compelled to resort to the gun rule for stray dogs that used to be in effect before the iniquitous dog assessment laws were put in force in this state. In former years in this county a mere suspicion of being a sheep killer sealed that dog's fate, and the sheep industry was in a more healthy condition than now.

A report of the viewers on the proposed Stamping Creek road was filed, with the estimates of cost and actual values of rights of way. The views of the land owners interested, for the most part, have not yet been secured. The court will be in session Tuesday, August 24.

Isaac C. Hill, whose death was mentioned last week was a son of the late George Hill and Martha (Edminston) Hill of Hills Creek. He spent his life in the vicinity of Lobelia, and was an honorable and upright citizen. He was married in his young days to Sarah Kinnison, a daughter of the late Jacob Kinnison, who preceded him to the grave a few years ago. He is survived by five children, two daughters and three sons—Miss Mariah Hill and Mrs. Morgan Kinnison, Ambrose Hill, Richard Hill and Bryan Hill. Mr. Hill was a brave and fearless soldier in the Confederate army, a member of the 22nd Virginia Cavalry, 36th Battalion. He was buried at the Lobelia cemetery and the funeral service was conducted by Rev. W. D. Eye of the Methodist Church.

Mrs. Nettie Callison Beard, wife of T. L. Beard, died at her home at Brandy Station, in Culpeper county, Virginia, Thursday, August 6, after a few days illness of peritonitis. She is survived by her husband and their three small daughters, and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Geo. W. Callison. Her body was buried at the McNeel graveyard Sunday afternoon in the presence of an immense congregation; services were conducted by Revs. Eye and Johnson. Mrs. Beard was in her 37th year of her age, and was a most useful christian woman.

The contest between Roneverte and Lewisburg over the courthouse will be settled by a special election called for the purpose on November 2nd. Until this election is over it will be quiet to go through the northern passes.

At a regular session of the council of the town of Hillsboro, Pocahontas county, held in the council chambers thereof, in the LaRue building on the 10th day of August, 1915, were present S. D. Kirk, Mayor; G. L. Carlisle, Recorder; and Dr. H. W. McNeel, F. P. Kidd and M. L. Isbell, members of the council of said town.
