To the Editor Times—

Some weeks ago T. J. Davis, of Skyles, answered my letter about potatoes and stated he had vines 39 1 2 inches high, and corn stalks 7 5 8 inches in circumference four inches from the ground. Now Bro. Davis, I will have to yield the palm leaf to you on potato vines, on oats and the circumference of your corn, but not in the height of corn. I have corn in my garden grown from a sample packet received Mr. Karkin, seedsman, Shenandoah, Iowa, called King Joe, which measures from the ground to the top of the tassle 119 1 2 inches, lacking but a half inch of being ten feet high. This seems to be a most remarkable kind of corn. There were twelve grains in the packet; I planted it April 20, and as it was very dry until May 20, the corn lay in the ground ere it came up. Nine kernels came up and have since made a wonderful growth. Two stalks became top heavy and broke over just above the ears, but are still growing. Nearly all have two ears to the stalk. This corn did not receive any extra cultivating, except a few doses of land plaster
