## AGRICULTURAL NOTES

BY BURT JOHNSON, COUNTY AGENT

**Why Belong to the Organization?**  
In Fayette County a series of meetings held during the first week of February brought over 100 new members into the organization. In this campaign, seven reasons were assigned why farmers should belong to the organization:  
1. To get and keep the state and government aid.  
2. To have a voice in planning the demonstration work.  
3. To make possible farmers' clubs in your community.  
4. To save by co-operative purchases.  
5. To have your name on the members' mailing list.  
6. To prove that you believe in team work, if a farmer.  
7. To show your community spirit, even if not an active farmer.

**Local Clubs Like Reading Circles.**  
About fifty clubs are following the regular reading circle courses offered by the Extension Department, College of Agriculture, through the county organization. Counties having the largest number are: Randolph 9, Jackson 6, Wood 6, Brooke 5, Mercer 5, Barbour 5, Ohio 4. The circles are studying Crops; 3; Animal Husbandry, 3; and Soil Improvement, over 40. The total number of farmers regularly attending these reading circles is over 800. At Martin School, in Marshall County, the Farmers' Reading Circles alternates with the School Social Center Meetings every other week. Under this plan not only are practically all the families of the community being reached, but nearly all the people in those families. Under the competent local leadership program are arranged so that everybody takes part.

**Monroe the Twenty-Ninth County.**  
Early in February the Monroe County Improvement Association signed up a Memorandum of Understanding with the Extension Department for a County Agricultural Agent for the two-year period beginning July 1, 1916. The County Court arranged for the local part of the salary in accordance with Chapter 39, Section 28, of the Code of West Virginia. The officers of the Monroe County Improvement Association are: Robt. B. Hudson, President; Robt. M. Steele, Secretary; H. P. Traut, Treasurer.

**Monongalia County Number Thirty.**  
In March arrangements were likewise completed for a County Agent in Monongalia County. The officers of the Farm Bureau are: W. H. Brand, President; Lynn Hastings, Secretary; L. V. Harner, Treasurer.

## THE POTATO SEED

STILL PRODUCED IN WYOMING AND POCAHONTAS COUNTY.

**Editor Pocahontas Times—**  
I read your interesting piece about potato seed in last week's Times. Wyoming is a State noted for its fine potatoes. It took first premium for potatoes in U. S. at Chicago World's Fair in 1903 and they were raised in Saratoga Valley, about 100 miles from where we live. As to the potato balls not forming and seeding, I will just say I could have sent Edward F. Bigelow or the Maine and Connecticut Agricultural Colleges a half bushel or more of the balls out of our garden for home use last year. The ground was old ground but very rich; the altitude 8,500 feet, and the potato vines very rank and covered with seed balls. I enclose small package of seed. I wished to experiment and see what they would raise, but I would rather send them to you, and you can give them to some Pocahontas farmer to experiment with, as our seasons are quite short here and they might get frosted before they had formed potatoes. Last fall was an unusually late season here, and lots of these balls were ripe, I am sure, and perfectly formed.

We raise all kinds of vegetables here by irrigation, except tomatoes, and we raise lots of green tomatos, and last year some ripe ones. The potatoes were raised by irrigation, and I know seed balls formed in plenty two years ago on ground that had been in potatoes for two seasons before that one. You can write to the Maine and Connecticut Agricultural Colleges about these seed balls, if you wish, and if they will write to me I will send them some this fall, provided they get ripe. We usually have frost from the first to the 12th of September each year. Very truly,

**Editor Times—**The potato berry Mr. Price speaks of still grows in this locality. Some seasons we have very few of them, especially if the blight strikes the vine; that destroys the vine and injures the potato crop. But when we have a good growth of vine and a good bloom we will see some berries. Last year my potatoes had a big bloom and I am sure there could have been two gallons, or more of berries gathered from them, and I remember of speaking of not having seen as many in one season for a long time. ## STATE NEWS

The town of Henderson, Mason county, filed complaint against the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company, alleging inadequate station facilities.

A complaint was filed by the town of Sutton against the Coal and Coke railroad charging that the passenger train schedule has been changed.

Frank L. Miller, a brakeman, 26, fell from a freight train on the Cumberland Valley railroad, and was killed, at Berkeley station.

The Church district, Wetzel county, election for a \$240,000 bond issue for good roads, carried with a count of 448 for and 131 against.

The annual field and track meet of the Ohio Valley Athletic Association will be held May 20 on the State Fair ground, at Wheeling.

The Bell telephone line, called the Fairmont and Wheeling toll line, is to be rebuilt between Moundsville and Wheeling at a cost of \$10,000.

The proposal to issue \$155,000 worth of bonds to make permanent the J. R. and K. Pike on the National Midland trail was adopted in the Lewisburg district by a vote of 377 to 220.

Captain M. R. Stone, connected with the medical department of the West Virginia National Guard for the last six years, has tendered his resignation from military service.

Herbert Anderson, a 16 year old boy, Barboursville, was killed when he attempted to jump on a moving west bound coal train, when he slipped and fell under the wheels.

A proposal to issue \$42,000 in bonds in Union district of Wood County for road improvements was defeated at a special election just held, the vote being 91 for and 152 against.

The annual enumeration of persons of school age has been completed for Morgantown school district by G. B. Stewart and shows a total of 3,475, a gain of 167 over last year.

Henry Lambert, country school teacher and Justice of the peace, of near Huntington, has just completed his fifty-first consecutive term of school as a teacher.

Cassius C. Hogg, ranking surgeon in the West Virginia National Guard, has tendered his resignation from the militia to Adjutant General John Bond. Major Hogg's home is in Huntington. His resignation will be accepted.

Application for permission to increase its rates fifty cents per month on business, office and party telephones, has been filed with the public service commission by the Wyoming Telephone Company of Oceana, Wyoming county.

The workmen's compensation department received reports of 490 accidents last week. Six of them resulted in fatalities. There were 82 accidents on each Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday, with 100 on Monday.

To increase the forest protection organization and extend the limits of territory covered by guards, a meeting of timber land owners was held at Charleston by J. A. Viquesney, of Belington, chief of the forest, fish and game department.

The lowest death rate in Wheeling for the month of March in several years is the record shown by the municipal health department report. Sixty three deaths were reported, the death rate being 11.2 per thousand, excluding 15 non-resident deaths.

Mrs. Joseph Morris, aged 17, Fairmont, drank poison because her husband failed to bring her a puppy, which she had been wanting for sometime. She was taken to a hospital where physicians managed to get her out of danger.

The Hazel-Atlas Glass Company, of Grafton, is converting a plant in the first ward into a big glass factory, announces that all unskilled laborers who work for the company two weeks or longer will receive a raise of fifteen cents a day in wages.

A representative of one of the largest shirt manufacturing concerns in the United States was at Sisterville pushing a movement to establish a branch factory there, the only condition thereto being that it be capable of hiring 150 girl employees.

Shepherdstown has decided that she has no use for a policeman, and it was decided to slice the salary in half and employ some one who need only give his spare moments to policing. Former Sergeant Robert Shipley agreed to take the job at the salary of \$15 per month.

Following the first annual meeting of its incorporators and stockholders, at Wheeling, announcement was made that the Wellburg and Eastern Railway Company will build a line from Wellburg to Washington, Pa., following Buffalo Creek.

Huntington's 1916 city directory, just out, gives the present population of the city as 45,000. The directory contains the names of 18,810 individuals in addition to the names of firms and corporations, an increase of 660 over the directory published for 1915.

E. B. Gerloch, county coroner at Huntington, was called in haste to a railroad track to examine the body of a man struck and killed by a train. He rolled the body over only to find that the man had been asleep. The next day Mr. Gerloch resigned his job.

The thirty-fourth annual encampment of the Department of West Virginia of the Grand Army of the Republic will be held at Sistersville May 16, 17 and 18. Commander Charles F. Reed, of Wheeling, announces that details for the encampment are being completed.

Shirley Phillips, aged 16, of Hardin, was instantly killed when struck by a ball pitched by J. E. Slaughter, of Weaver, in a baseball game between rival teams from the two towns. Slaughter was exonerated.

The fall meeting of the Ohio Valley Round Table, composed of school teachers and educators of eastern Ohio and West Virginia, will be held in Wheeling, it is announced. The date
