

PROPHECY OF MONK

IN 1600 FORETOLD KAISER-MADE WAR

The New York Globe has printed the remarkable document below, which was published in the Paris Figaro and is a prophecy written in 1600 by a monk whose name was Brother Johannes:

"The veritable Antichrist will be a monarch of his time, a son of Luther, he will invoke God's name, and proclaim himself his enemy, this prince of His will take his oath on the Bible, and will exploit himself as the arm of the Most High, sent to chastise the corrupted people of the world."

"He will be one-armed, but his army, which will be as the sands of the seashore, will take for their device, 'God with us.' For a long while he will carry out his policy, by ruse or by felony; his spies will cover the countries of the world, he will be master of the decrees of the powerful."

"He will have in his pay doctors and professors, who will prove and certify his celestial mission. War will give him an opportunity to disclose himself. This will not be made against a French king, but another well known, and it will be so violent that in two weeks the conflict will become universal. It will draw in all Christian people, Mussulmans, and even men from distant lands."

"The armies will gather from the four quarters of the world, for the angels will open the souls of men, and in the third week they will realize that Antichrist has come and that slavery will be the fate of the conquered. He will be recognized by several traits. He will massacre, above all, priests, monks, women, children, and old men." To none will he show mercy. Torch in hand, he will pass like a savage, invoking the name of Christ, and, while his words are those of a Christian, his acts will be the acts of Nero and his Roman persecutors.

"He will have an eagle for his arms, and an eagle will be the crest of his accomplice, the other wicked monarch. This latter, however, is a Christian, and will die with the curse of Pope Benedictus, who will be elected at the outbreak of Antichrist."

"No more will priest and monk confess and absolve the combatants; for the first time in the world's history they will take their place in the combat with other citizens, and Pope Benedictus having pronounced his malediction upon Antichrist, his holiness will proclaim that those who fall in battle rise as martyrs."

"The bell will resound thro'out the world, giving courage to soldiers, and sounding the knell of Antichrist's accomplice. To vanquish Antichrist will require more men than Rome ever held. The efforts of every kingdom, 'the cock,' 'the leopard,' and the 'white eagle' will not avail, without the prayers of the Christian world assist them. Never will the human race have met so great a peril, for the triumph of Antichrist would be the victory of the devil."

"It will come to pass in the twentieth century, after the incarnation of the Word, that the beast will menace the earth with its scourge. Toward the two-thousandth year the great army of Antichrist, numbering in its ranks some who are Christians, will oppose the armies of the Lamb, with whom will fight Mohammedans and 'savage' soldiers. All will be blood red, the heavens, the earth,

the sea, the air, for blood will flow in all the elements.

"The 'black eagle' will hurl itself against the 'cock' and rob it of many plumes, but the 'cock' will fight gallantly with its talons. It would be crushed but for the claws of the 'leopard.' The 'black eagle' will surprise and invade the land of the 'cock,' covering almost half of its territory; while the white eagle in its turn will overrun the realm of Antichrist from boundary to boundary."

"Then the 'black eagle' will be forced to leave the 'cock,' to engage the 'white eagle,' the 'cock' will pursue it to give aid to its ally. When the 'black eagle' sees all is lost it will grow furious, and the 'white eagle's' beak, the 'leopard's' claw, and the 'cock's' talons will be buried in its flesh."

"Rivers will run blood, and only the princes and the great captains will be buried. The dead, piled high, will seem to divert the streams from their course. In the carnage the brave will fall, and those who survive the battle will succumb to pestilence and famine."

"Several times will Antichrist seek to make peace, but the seven angels that march before the Lamb have decreed that only with his extermination can peace be restored. He shall be crushed like straw under the mill. He shall lose his crown, and his kingdom shall be split into twenty-two states, and none shall possess either arms, ship, or stronghold."

"The 'white eagle' shall trace the crescent out of Europe and install himself in his abode. Then shall begin the era of peace and prosperity. The Lamb shall reign and the joy of humanity begin."

"Happy he who, escaping the perils of this wonderful period, may taste of the fruit of the reign of the Spirit and the sanctification of humanity, which cannot be accomplished save by the destruction of Antichrist."

"The symbolic 'leopard' may cause some difficulty in identification, but the 'leopard' is well known in British heraldry. The Gallic 'cock' on the other hand, is quite familiar, and the 'eagles' are easily recognizable.—Philadelphia North American.

DRY WHAT YOU CANNOT CAN

The response to the President's appeal for the production of more food has been tremendous, but the growing of fruits and vegetables is not the end. These will represent time, labor and money wasted if they are not handled so that every particle will be used for food. There must be no waste. After the fresh products have been taken care of by normal demand the surplus must be conserved for the winter months.

The American people have learned the value of saving surplus products through canning and preserving. This year there will be a tremendous amount of home canning not only in the country but in the city homes.

But in view of the serious shortage of tin cans and the limited supply of glass jars, there is likely to be great spoilage and waste of garden and orchard crops unless additional means of conserving them are adopted. All foods possible must be saved by drying.

Drying will require more time and labor, but the vegetables should be saved. Care should be taken to screen the food being dried, from flies. A frame may be made from an old window screen, piece of tin roofing or wooden tray, with the top covered with wire netting, cheesecloth, or mosquito netting to keep out flies.

Steam drying may be done by converting double roast pan into a home made boiling water is put in the bottom and the top inverted. A layer of fruit in the upper pan will dry very quickly.

For oven drying it is better to use a cheesecloth or net covered frame as moisture condenses on the metal trays before evaporating, and a longer period is required for drying. The

door of the oven should be left open. Oven dried products are not so evenly colored as the sun dried fruit.

After being fully dried the food should be stored so as to prevent it becoming 'wormy' and to keep free from dust. This can be done by careful sacking in cloth bags inside of a paper sack or by storing in tin or paper boxes.

String beans may be dried by breaking into pieces and drying as any other article or they may be broken into pieces, cooked 30 minutes, and then dried as usual.

Corn is especially good when dried. Take tender roasting ears, cook until nearly done, cut from cob with a sharp knife, spread thinly upon rack or dishes. If corn is soaked in cold water an hour before cooking the product will be better. Corn may be dried without cooking by simply taking the tender roasting ears and cutting off at once and drying in the usual manner.

To dry apples, peel, quarter, and core. Cut into eighths. The original color of the apple will be retained if soaked in salt water 10 minutes. To one gallon of water use three tablespoons of salt. Dry quickly by any of the methods.

Before closing dried fruit or vegetables in cans, jars, or tight boxes, place them in a warm oven for an hour, then cool and pack.—May Johnson, County Home Demonstration Agent.
