## EDRAY DISTRICT HIGH SCHOOL

Educational rallies have been held at several places in Edray District. At the Beckeye school about fifty patrons and pupils were present; at West Union church on Saturday night an audience of seventy-five heard the address; at the Union church on Sunday morning forty attended; at the Hannah school on Elk about fifty were present. The addresses were made by Miss Merrells, and on Wednesday night she will speak at Stony Bottom school. Much interest is being manifested by the younger and progressive teachers of the district in the High school. Pupils will attend fairly well from nearly all points of the district. Suitable boarding and lodging can be secured at from \$14 to \$20.00 per month. Let every boy and girl having a Free School Diploma be enrolled in high school this fall. Remember the date—9 a. m. Monday September 10th.

Miss Virginia Guseman is the guest of her sister, Miss Sadie Guseman, the representative of W. Va. University in Extension work of girls clubs, at White Sulphur Springs during the week. All pupils who desire to enter the English grades and who failed at the last session's examination in not more than two subjects will be given an entrance examination in those subjects on Monday by the principal. As far as possible all pupils having been passed to the eighth grade are urged to attend the Junior High School. Remember to bring your old school books with you in order to exchange them for the new ones. Mr. Hubert D. Lowry, a graduate of Shepherd College, will teach the English grade (in part) and manual training in high school.

The observance of Labor Day in America dates from 1882 when the labor unions of Massachusetts set the first day of September as a holiday. The first legal recognition was the act passed by New York in 1887. It was made a national holiday in 1894 under a bill introduced by Amos Cummings. The states recognized it and it is now a holiday in all the states and in Porto Rico, Hawaii and Alaska.

## PHILIP KRAMER

The venerable Philip Kramer died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. S. C. Galford, near Linwood, on Monday August 27, 1917, aged 74 years, 8 months and 18 days. His body was laid to rest in the Varner graveyard after services at his late home by Rev. M. H. Ramsey. Surviving him are his daughters, Mrs. John Doyle, Mrs. Jacob Gibson and Mrs. S. C. Galford, and his son Uriah H. and John Kramer. Of his father's family there remain his brothers, J. Hull, J. K. Norman and P. K. Kramer, and J. C. Wiley and Mrs. Stewart.

Mr. Kramer was a native of Highland, but for many years has been a citizen of this county. He was a useful, honest citizen. He was a professing Christian and for many years had been an elder in the Presbyterian church.

At the outbreak of the war between the States he volunteered as a Confederate soldier and saw much service. The Pennsylvania campaign he had his shoulder broken by being struck with a sabre.

## TRAINS TO BE RESUMED

On Wednesday afternoon the Times received a telegram from Senator N. C. McNeill, who was in Charleston to the effect that the Public Service Commission had decided to replace the morning and evening trains on the Greenbrier Division after the second forty per cent of the drafted army had been mobilized. The first forty per cent will go September 19 and the second forty per cent October 3rd.

Senator McNeill was in Charleston to appear before the Commission as attorney for the petitioners desiring the giving us back our train service. We are much obliged to everybody, as the loss of these trains caused great inconvenience.

## THE CHATAQUA

The Pocahontas County Chautauqua begins today with a big parade at 4:30 this afternoon. All the children of the town have been invited to assemble at the graded school house. Pictures will be taken of the parade, to be shown at night. Paraders will be admitted free this evening.

The Junior Chautauqua work will be an important feature. This is intended for children from the ages of six to fourteen. It will be under the direction of Mrs. Yarnell. The boys will do "aid work", athletic work and team work. The girls will be taught games and songs. Each morning the children will come together to hear some of the finest children's literature.

On the opening day will be organized as a "Junior Town." Officers are elected each morning the affairs of "Junior Town" are settled the same as those of a regular municipality. On the last afternoon the Juniors will give a pageant called "Good Fairy Thrift."

## A. J. SMITH

The venerable A. J. Smith died at his home at Edray Friday night, August 31, 1917, after an illness of several months of infirmities incident to age. He was in his 78th year. Some months ago his wife preceded him to the grave. On Sunday morning he was buried at the Edray church in the presence of a large congregation. The service was conducted by Rev. Geo. P. Moore. Among his children are Mrs. Samuel Moore, Mrs. L. J. Moore, Mrs. J. E. Barlow, Luther, Oliver and E. M. Smith. Mrs. Smith was an honest, upright citizen and for nearly sixty years had been a professing Christian and member of the Methodist church.

## COUNTY COURT

At the meeting of the county court last week J. S. McNeill was elected president of the court. Mary McQuain allowed \$5.00 per month for support. S. L. Hogsett and J. S. Welford recommended for notary commissioners. An order was entered directing sheriff to collect captioned road tax. Settlement with L. S. Cochran, late sheriff, was approved, and he was directed to pay over the sum of \$13,720.57 in county funds to his successor. The local board received a telegram from Mayor Wallace as follows: "The Secretary of War directs that men called to the mobilization camps take with them a pair of comfortable shoes to afford them a change from their heavy marching shoes."

## A CARD

### FROM THE POCAHONTAS CATTLE CLUB.

To the Breeders and Cattle Growers of Pocahontas County: At a time without parallel in the history of the industry which the Pocahontas Cattle Club represents, and as president of this organization, I urge all farmers in this community to become members of the Club that they may more fully participate in the improved advantages that we hope to effect. Thinking that there may be still some who do not know of the purposes of this club, it may be well to state that we formed our association early last fall, having as its chief aim the improvement of cattle conditions in our county. Before the actual formation of the club, a number of us viewed with alarm the gradual decrease of stock of all kinds throughout the country and we resolved to do our best to see that Pocahontas did her share in remedying these conditions. Our Club is, we believe, the very first formed in the state for this purpose. We learn from various published statements of our National and State Departments of Agriculture that each year shows a decrease in stock of every kind in this country. Added to the very serious shortage in Europe due to war conditions, a shortage which will continue for many years to come. From a monetary point of view, which it seems to us should not be the first consideration during these times, for if for no other reason, we are in hopes that more than a passive interest will be taken in the Club. That Pocahontas is favored by nature for growing cattle is self evident. All that is required is an active interest by cattle growers to see that not only the quantity of cattle is increased, but the quality as well. We propose a central meeting place where buyers and sellers can meet on common ground and where it will be possible for the seller to show his stock to advantage. In such a gathering an interchange of ideas may be had and stock for breeding may be selected. Every member of this club will have a vote in its management and the choice of the majority will rule. We have observed a growing tendency of our young men to leave our farms, going into localities where they believe their future outlook will be brighter. Unless our farm conditions improve this state of affairs will keep pace with the various enterprises of the country and we ask the support of the citizens of the county that this object might be attained. The business men of the county have shown their interest in our project by liberal donations. Let the farmer come forward to "do his bit" which he should be willing to do not only as a benefit to himself but also in this critical time, as an aid to his Government. We propose from time to time to publish notice of our meetings in the county papers and we extend a most cordial welcome to all. Very truly yours, POCAHONTAS CATTLE CLUB.
