FROM A SOLDIER BOY
E. C. CLENDENNIN, OF BATTERY B, 313
REGIMENT, F. A. WRITES FROM
CAMP LEE, VA.

Thinking perhaps the boys from Pocahontas who are to be future soldiers of Camp Lee might be interested to know a little about their future home, I take this opportunity to give them some little idea of what they may expect when they reach here.

Camp Lee is a pretty good sized town. It is built in the shape of a horse shoe and is about twelve miles long, measuring from toe to toe of the horseshoe. The barracks are two story buildings and are built to accommodate about two hundred men. Each man has a cot as well as his own mess kit; each fellow having to do his own dish washing as well as washing his wearing apparel.

The Field Artillery, which all of the Poca boys so far are members, consists of two and three inch guns drawn by four to eight horses. It is for the most part a mounted service and while there is lots of hard work connected with it, it is considered one of the most interesting branches of the service. The artillerymen as they will not have any trench work as they will be located behind the front line trenches. They will not have any rifles but each will be equipped with a 45 caliber Colt revolver. The artillery is made up of Batteries which corresponds to a company of Infantry; each Battery consists of 150 men and 165 horses. The horses have not arrived yet and will not be in for some time.

It is hardly possible that the incoming boys will get their uniforms for a week or more after arriving here, so it would be well for them to bring some work clothes. A suit case is permissible and one can bring almost anything they want as long as they can get it in a suit case.
