### CAMP GREENLEAF

Editor Times:—I have seen your paper a time or two since here, but have seen no letters from the Pocahontas boys from this camp, so I will try to give you some news of the boys and some description of this Camp as far as permissible and some facts of our Camp life.

I presume that your readers know that this is almost entirely a medical camp. The balance is made up of artillery, infantry, cavalry and R. O. T. C. (Reserve Officers Training Camp.)

It is an interesting fact to know that this is the largest medical camp in the world.

Camp Greenleaf is in Chickamauga Park, which is a historic battle field of the Civil War. That battle was fought in September 1863, and was won by the Confederate forces. I have visited some very interesting points in the old battle field. Many of the Southern states have erected monuments in memory of the men who fought so bravely.

The park is situated on low rolling ground and it is from four to six miles across it at any point. It has beautiful roads traversing it from every angle, and are plied by sight seeing cars continually.

This beautiful Park is now covered with huge barracks, and is a swarming city of khaki clothed men here with a purpose, with their jaws set and willing to do the duty assigned to them. Some of the duties are not easy, and are performed by men from every walk of life. For instance, I know a man here who has an A. B. degree in college and can talk French and German and several other languages. This man is driving a truck but is performing his duty with a free heart.

I am just a few hundred yards from the German prison camp. It is very interesting to watch them in the way they work and play.

We Pocahontas boys were together in Detention camps for about two weeks. They were transferred at the end of that time to different parts of the camp and probably some were sent away. All the boys were well the last I heard of them. Some of them got very sick after inoculation, but it only lasts a day or so.

I am the only Pocahontas boy left anywhere near where we were in detention. I was transferred to Headquarters Hospital Trains, a hundred yards away. I am assisting a transportation and Supply Captain. I keep track of several trucks hauling men, baggage, supplies, etc., help in the supply house some and attend lectures when I can—drill one hour a day and attend M. C. officers' night school. I sleep in the supply house just in front of a row of officers tent, and my elbow hinges pretty good now from the effect of saluting. The officers are fine men as a rule, and the ones I am in contact with are especially fine.

It may interest you to know that a Hospital Train is a train plying between the Base Hospital in France to the line of advance of the Armies. I am in the headquarters of these trains and may get assigned to one in the future.

Just one word before I close, for the mothers who have boys in camp. Don't worry about your boy, for he is taken care of better than you can take care of him. If he gets bad sick an ambulance takes him to the hospital in a "jiffy." If sick he don't have to work, and has a chance to go on sick call each day. If much sicker he is taken to the hospital.

The rations are good and plenty of them, so don't worry about your boy going hungry. Don't send him chicken to eat; if you send a box make cake, candy, or maple sugar and he will be pleased.

It is most time for tattoo, so I will have to close.

H. W. Comstock, of the Virginian Joint Stock Land Bank of Charleston, W. Va., will be in Pocahontas at the following times and place for the purpose of taking applications for loans on farm lands from the Virginian Joint Stock Land Bank—
