## NEXT SOLDIERS TO GO

The Local Board met last Saturday to select the twelve men who will be forwarded to Camp Meade, Admiral, Maryland, on Saturday, April 27th. From the following list the 12 men will be selected in their order number:

Harmon E. Galford, Homer Moreland, Joe Collins, Forrest A. Galford, W. F. Flynn, Hoy Mullenax, Elmer M. Sharp, Guy T. Blake, James Akers, Arnold H. Gladwell, Willie Ware John J. Lyons, Arthur R. Grogg, Corbett White, Simpson F. Gragg, Roy Kellison, Clyde B. Buzzard.

In selecting the names of the registrants to fill this call, the Board was again directed by the Adjutant General to pass over the names of those who are actively engaged in agricultural work. In exercising this discretion the Board passed over the following names: Everett Dilley, Fred Adkison, Winters J. Jordan and Silas D. Dean. If at any time it appears to the Board that those so passed over are trifling with their deferment, and are not giving their whole time and attention to planting or harvesting of a crop, they will be immediately inducted into military service and forwarded to Camp Lee.

Another call has been issued for men to be entrained during the five-day period beginning May 10. This County's quota will be six men, and they will be sent to Fort Thomas, Kentucky. The Board has not yet selected the names of those who will make up this call.

The banks, solicitors and agencies taking subscriptions are asked to report the amount of same by district—not the name and amount of each subscriber—to the office of the County Chairman, on each Saturday evening of the campaign. These reports will be tabulated and given to the public and published in the county papers.

At the close of the first week there was reported about \$50,000.00, but the last half will be hard to get and will take work.
