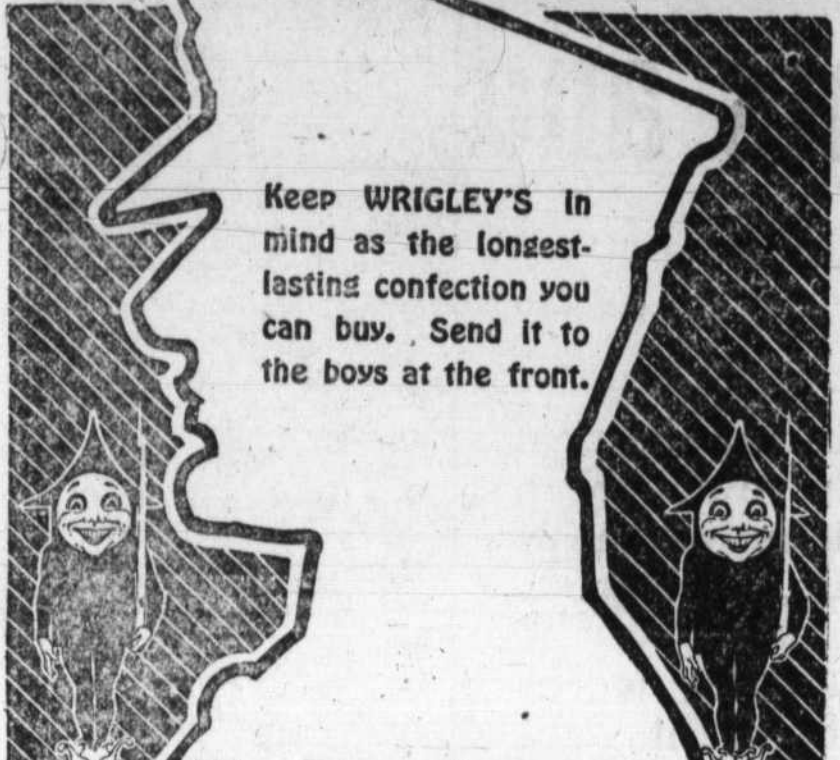

POCAHONTAS HORSE SHOW

To the Pocahontas Times:
We are in the midst of a World's War. The most destructive, the most expensive the world has ever seen. Right must win, even tho it takes endurance to conquer might. Tho the Kaiser says "Me and My Gott" before the finish you will find the Lord is on the other side. God has never been on the wrong side.

America today is the most resourceful country on the face of the earth. Our hills filled with black diamonds, our Rockies with its silver and gold, our plateaux peopled with its horses, cattle and sheep; the plains of Kansas, Nebraska, and Colorado raising enough wheat and oats for the world and the Alleghenys furnishing iron and coal for the commerce of the globe. Yet with all this we are asking for Conservation. Conservation of food, conservation of money, conservation of meat and conservation of clothing. If the Government is asking Conservation we must give heed. We must win. There is no alternative. If we must go back to the spinning wheel and home spun jeans we can do it. We did it once. Tho we are resourceful, conservation is going to win this long drawn out conflict. Waste will deplete any country matters not what its resources. Quoting a horse paper "America's sons will stop the Hun, America's dollars will make them holler."

This is a big country and in order for each to accomplish this great end each part must look to its own resources. With this great excitement over food, food supplies and high prices for food products I fear we are overlooking what may in the future prove a bad mistake. For instance, feed being high the farmer will turn all his attention to raising feed that he can get a good cash price for each year. The man who has to buy feed to raise a few head of stock will simply, until conditions change, let his stock go.

A crop of grain can be raised each year. It takes four years to raise a three year old steer, six years to raise a cavalry or artillery horse. Trucks are all right in their place, to cover territory over good roads, but don't you know that all this stuff that is hauled in trucks has to be hauled the last five or six miles by horse power? Isn't Pershing recommending Congress right now to equip five regiments of cavalry? It is awfully easy to overlook and unless some one is especially interested will not notice when the farmers have quit breeding stock. Without young stock coming on all the time there is no stock to take the place of what goes on the market.

Doesn't any one with foresight know that when a farmer goes to market with a nice bunch of three year old cattle that he must come home and put the biggest part of that money into two year olds or else it is his last trip to market? I see very few papers except purely horse papers talking conservation of live stock. Many are talking conservation food supplies, coal, timber, clothes, etc., so I offer my plea principally for live stock.

In what class would you place Pocahontas? The timber is mostly cut out. I think you would easily place it in the Live Stock Column. Therefore it is our duty if we wish to win this war, so work for the conservation of what we have and best adapted for. They must have horses, cattle, pork and mutton. I have noted with pleasure the interest taken by some men in the Connty to organize a calf show, offering good purses for the best purebred calf. This is exactly right. Make it for the pure bred. The day of the dunghill is past. The blue grass on the hills of Pocahontas will raise the best, so have the blood right.

I want to put a question to the best business and thinking men in the county. What has done the most to stimulate the raising and bringing into the county of good stock? I feel any one has to answer, The Pocahontas Horse Show, started five years ago on a very moderate scale by E. H. McLaughlin on his farm at Hillsboro. Well do I remember that year a temporary 1-8 mile track circling the top of the little hill in a field, no grand stand, no stalls, and there was not a standard bred horse on the grounds. I there might have been one automobile standing around. Mr. Farmer, did you see it last year? Did you look all the horses over? Have you tried to figure how many standard bred horses are in the county now? Have you figured the good this enterprise has already done the county? The Government has decided that the standard bred trotter is the army horse par excellence. Horsemen are beginning to see a horse famine. If the Government decides to equip five regiments of cavalry and can't get them in this country will you please tell me where they would go to get them? A meeting of horsemen from all over the United States was called in New York in February to try en-

Well, being as I cannot write on all points as I would like to it is rather hard to write, so one and all, don't worry about us West Virginia boys. We have what it takes to do the work. So I will tell my friends and loved ones good night for this time. Will write again. I would be pleased to hear from any one, as it helps to keep us in good spirits when we can know what is going on around our own home and State.
