I have been traveling ever since I left the U. S., but no more now for a while. I have traveled through a great part of England and have seen some very fine country. It is some what like the country in the U.S. The people in England treat the U. S. soldiers nice.

The greater part of the boys in our regiment can talk French and they ones that cannot talk, but the French people all like the American soldiers. On our way to where I am now we had an air raid which lasted about fire to one house and done great dam-

I am now living in a billet in a little town and it is real nice with fresh air all the time.
