JUST A WORD FROM IRA IRVINE

To The People of Pocahontas County: Friday, November 5th, 1920.

I, the writer, desire to present a statement, which is as follows. It seems that the time is drawing near when I am to begin the work of county surveyor, and before beginning I want to be better understood than I have been. And I will say all I have to say without boasting, for I have nothing to boast about.

The cause of this statement being made is by a statement in the Marlinton Journal dated Thursday the 4th, that "Ira Irvine is being tickled to death because he beat Frank Baxter for county surveyor." It is not my nature to be tickled over things of vital nature, and while I feel very much appreciation to the people for giving me the office, it is far from the condition of my heart to be tickled over the success of defeating my opponent. I tell you from the full depth of my feeling that to even defeat an enemy does not cause me to be tickled, and when I think back to the days gone by when I worked for the father and a brother of Mr. Frank Baxter, and carried one end of a chain with Mr. Baxter himself, and further, when I recall that they treated me honestly and kindly, my feeling toward Mr. Baxter is more like still water than it is a babbling stream.
