### FRANK DILLEY, DEAD

Frank Dilley died at the home of C. F. Gay, in Marlinton, Thursday night, December 23, 1920, after a long illness. Had he lived until June, he would have been 72 years old. Burial on Sunday at the Sharp graveyard near Green Hill on Stony Creek, after services conducted at the home by Rev. J. H. Light, D. D.

Mr. Dilley was a good citizen and a member of the Methodist church. He was a most industrious man. A few years ago he suffered the loss of a leg by a horse falling on him.

Frank Dilley was a son of the late Josiah Dilley and his wife Sarah Friel Dilley. He was twice married, his first wife being Mary E. Sharp, and to them were born seven children: Mrs. C. F. Gay, Mrs. Dew Waugh and Mrs. Gertrude Etzler, Wallace and Sterling survive, and Jacob Dilley and Mrs. Henry Galford are dead. His last wife was Mrs. Rebecca Jordan who survives her husband.

J. A.
