

## FROM TEXAS

Editor Times:

As Pocahontas was once my home, and thinking some of my friends would like to hear from me, I will give them a brief and perhaps an uninteresting description of my travels

since July 23rd.

My route first called me through the northern and north-eastern part of Texas, stopping at all towns of importance. The country is very much alike, a rolling prairie, interspersed with belts of timber making it beautiful in appearance. Further on I struck the pine regions of Texas which reminded me very much of West Virginia. Saw mills in abundance were in operation in this region. This pine region has one advantage over West Virginia; that is, in the way of railroads on which to transport lumber to any point. Lumbering is carried on extensively in all

the eastern part of this state.

At Texarkana I crossed over into Arkansas. I must say, as I always had a great antipathy for Arkansas, and as I wrote to some of my friends at Fort Worth, I felt as if I were 'banished off the face of the earth," however to do justice to the home of the "Arkansaw Traveler," I must say I was agreeably surprised sometimes. After traveling through the southern and roughest portion of the state, which is thickly timbered and swampy, I went by way of Brinkly to Little Rock and then found on that road some fine country. Little Rock, overlooking the river, is quite a nice place. The capitol building is rather ancient in appearance and I hardly think does justice to the State.

Management of bees in the spring was the subject of a talk in the after noon by E. T. Adkins, of Watertown Wis. He stressed the importance of leaving plenty of honey in the hive for bad weather so the brood rearing shall not be retarding. If the rearing was retarded, he said, it would later result ir there being too few young bees ready to gather the crop of honey, when the flowers that furnish the bulk of honey come into

George S. Demuth, editor, of Gleanings in Bee Culture, published in Medina, O., gave a talk on the control of swarming. He told how by placing the new hive where the .old one stood, after setting the old hive to one side, the new swarm would be hived on the cld stand and the old field workers would be kept in the same place. By this means, he said, more honey could be obtained than when a swarm is hived in a new location, a method which divides the working force of the colony. He also told how to fix the colonies to prevent swarming entirely, so that is is not necessary to stay at home to watch for swarming during the swarming

Dr. Phillips in a second lecture, described the diseases which destroys the young bees in such numbers while still in the larvae stage of development. He also gave directions for the treatment of these diseases.

W. R. Lerch, of Medina, O., spoke on the merchandizing of honey.
