HUNG JURY
The jury failed to reach a verdict in the case of State of West Virginia against Brown L. Galford, tried in the Randolph Circuit Court at Elkins last week. It is presumed that the case will be retried in Elkins at the September term. Galford is being tried for the killing of George W. Duncan in November, 1919, while Galford was serving as a Marlinton policeman. At the first trial Galford was sentenced to 15 years. The Supreme Court granted a new trial.

Notice to Taxpayers
In compliance with the new law and at the instance of the State Tax Commissioner, I give the following notice.
On or after July 1st I will begin to revalue the real estate together with the improvements thereon, as required by the acts of the Legislature 1921. All persons who own real estate in this county with improvements not assessed thereon, are requested to come to the assessor's office and have same placed on the land books for 1921, as all such improvements I find after commencing the re-valuation not on the land books I will be compelled to back tax for the years said improvements did not appear on said books for taxation, at the increased value of said property as provided by law.
The Tax Commissioner asks that the assessors begin now the preliminary work for the next year's assessment of property, as time was not given to make effective the provisions of the assessment bill passed by the recent legislature to any great extent in this years assessment.
This is in accordance with the directions of the State Tax Commissioner's general plan of bringing about a re-assessment of all real estate upon the basis of its "true and actual value."
The meaning of the above notice is that every real estate owner who has not given in the improvements on his land is required to appear at the assessor's office and list such improvements or suffer the penalty of having back taxes charged against him at the increased value of said property as required by law.
