HEREFORD ASSOCIATION

The annual meeting of the Pocahontas County Hereford Breeder's Association was held at Mr. Stillwell's store at Hillsboro, Saturday afternoon.

F. P. Kidd, secretary of the organization, in reviewing the past year's work, stated that the association had done considerable advertising to let people over the state know that Pocahontas County is a center for registered Hereford Cattle of merit. Also, that they had taken an active part in the calf club project. The association is now fitting show cattle for the Pocahontas County Fair, the Greenbrier Valley Fair, and the Clarksburg Sale. It is also planned to erect a dipping vat for cattle, sheep, hogs, and horses, according to specifications given out by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. One farmer present stated that he did not propose to feed lice another year.

An amendment to the by-laws concerning membership fees was made, namely, an enrollment fee of \$5.00 and 25 cents per head on each animal either registered or eligible for registration, and an annual fee of 25 cents per head thereafter. As the by-laws previously read a membership fee of \$5.00 would be charged each year.

Officers were elected as follows: President, D. M. Callison; Vice-President, A. C. Barlow; Sec. & Treas., F. P. Kidd. The directors are: J. M. Cullip, J. S. McNeel, and Elmer Poage.

If you are a breeder of registered Hereford cattle in Pocahontas County, it is your duty to further their extension by joining hands with this Association. Apply to F. P. Kidd for particulars.

The association will hold their next meeting April 15th at 2 o'clock in the High School Auditorium. B. F. Creech, extension beef cattle specialist, will address the meeting. All farmers are invited to attend this meeting whether members or not.

GALFORD ACQUITTED

At the Elkins Court last week, the jury brought in a verdict of not guilty in the case of Brown L. Galford, who was being tried for the killing of George W. Duncan. This case was taken to Randolph County from Pocahontas County. This was the third time the case was tried. The first trial at Marlinton resulted in a verdict of second degree murder, and a sentence of 15 years was imposed. The Supreme Court granted the defendant a rehearing. The second trial was at Elkins on a change of venue and the jury failed to agree on a verdict.

On the night of November 11, 1918, Brown L. Galford was a policeman of the town of Marlinton. He attempted to arrest George W. Duncan. Duncan resisted, and in the mixup he was shot and killed.
