We have reached a point in the business affairs of the County where Brother Jonah Quackenbush, A Whit something will have to be done for the main business farming, if we continue to prosper, and we will have to do it ourselves. It looks to us that the steer will have to step aside for the dairy cow as the main source of

income with our people.

Under existing conditions, the income in Pocahoutas from chickens, turkeys and eggs is no mean sum. With a creamery a side line or waste product is the skim milk. It is a valuable food for poultry and pigs. We have it on the authority of a farm specialist that this item alone pays the keep of a cow when marketed in poultry, eggs and bacon.

The development of the motor truck will enable a creamery to maintain proving property and paying cost of milk routes covering a radius of twenty five miles and more. This would accomodate the farmers of the Knapps Creek Valley, the Greenbank country, Elk, Clover Lick, and the Levels. Also trips into Highland and Bath whenever the milk supply would justify. # EDUCATIONAL NOTES

Unless changed by the next State Legislature, the requirements for a first grade certificare by examination will be four units of high school work and one unit of professional work. Following is the schedule of examination dates for 1923.

First Examination, April 26-27.
Second Examination, June 14-15.
Examination on High School Subjects for High School Credits, Friday, June 1.

Examination on Reading Circle Books for Professional Credit Coupons of Credit, and Renewal of first Grade

Only one examination will be given on High School Subjects and Reading

(Five Year) Certificates, Saturday,

At the present time first grade temporary certificates are issued to high school graduates who do nine weeks of work in Normal Schools Teachers who have held temporary certificates may renew the certificate
by attendance in an approved school

for nine weeks.

It is probable that this regulation will continue for another year.

All first grade (five year) certificates

equire for the second renewal credit as follows: 1. Six week's attendance in an accredited school, or
2. Sixhours of credit earned by ex-2. Sixhours of credit earned by ex-tension work during the life of the certificate or

3. Passing an examination on two reading circle books with a minimum No regulations have been made for the issuance and renewal of provisional high school certificates except for those which expire June 30, 1923. Regulations for the issuance of high school certificates will be made by the State Board of Education in January.


