From those submitted the best will be selected and adopted by council as the official flag and seal of the city, it is announced.

NEWS CULLINGS FROM WEST VIRGINIA

Wellsburg—Mrs. Mildred E. Stephens was sworn in as a deputy sheriff. She is the mother of a little girl and the wife of the sheriff.

Wellsburg—Joe Tracz, of Avella, Pa., was sentenced to serve 8 years in the penitentiary after pleading guilty to a charge of conspiracy in connection with the Cliftonville mine riot last year.

Bluefield—The body of Henry Rogowski, 7-year-old cripple who disappeared from his home at Gary, McDowell county, was found in the icy waters of Tug river several miles from his home. It is thought the boy fell from a foot bridge.

Charleston—A flock of 40 or 50 pine siskins, birds rarely seen in West Virginia, were discovered in Kanawha City by I. H. Johnson, the bird authority of the state department of agriculture. Mr. Johnson reported that he also saw about 50 meadow larks.

Wheeling—Joe Koelson, a miner of Herrick, O., died here as a result of gunshot wounds occurring when a neighbor's lad is said to have accidentally discharged a gun in the latter's home. The father of the boy was examining a gun when Koelson dropped in for a social call and laid the gun on a bed. The boy, who is said to be under five, started to play with the gun.

Clarksburg—Completing a two-day session, directors of the West Virginia Co-operative Warehouse association completed a preliminary plan for the marketing of 1923 wool in the state and planned for ten regional conferences to present the project to farmers throughout the state. It is planned to secure a 1,000 membership who will agree to pool their wool over a five-year period.

Weston—Weston has put in her bid for the special council to be called by Rt. Rev. W. L. Gravatt, of the Protestant Episcopal church in West Virginia for the election of a bishop coadjutor. The council will be called early this spring, according to action taken at the meeting last month in Bluefield, where attendance of delegates was too meagre to warrant balloting on a bishop co-adjutor.

Huntington—St. Edwards preparatory college here will be closed at the termination of the present semester and the property converted into a hospital, according to word received here by Rev. Dr. H. B. Altmyer from Rt. Rev. John J. Swint, bishop of Wheeling. The school, admitting only boys, was founded by the late Bishop P. J. Donahue. The nursing staff of the hospital is to be comprised of members of a well known sisterhood already active in the state, it is said.

Charleston—Sunday afternoon concerts by the Charleston Symphony orchestra are going to meet the opposition of the Charleston Ministerial association. At least they are as long as an admission is charged. The association discussed the Sunday concerns in its regular monthly meeting and instructed a committee appointed about a year ago to confer with the officials of the orchestra association and ascertain whether the concerts will be made free or discontinued on Sunday afternoons.

Morgantown—Dairymen of Monongalia county are receiving little more than a laborer's wage and interest on their invested capital, Professor K. L. Anthony, head of the dair. department of the West Virginia university college of agriculture declared in discussing a joint meeting of dairymen and representatives of local organizations. The meeting was called by the dairymen to inform representatives of the city and local bodies as to the actual cost of producing milk and to show why the farmers are not making more than a living wage from their dairy herds.

Wheeling—\$37,000 a year! According to figure experts in city hall here this would be the income derived annually from 85 slot machines in operation in the city of Wheeling, which are owned by Joseph Carbral. Here are the figures: 85 machines at \$50 each would give a total income of \$4,250 weekly. Splitting this 50-50 with the establishments where the machines are placed, the owner would take down his share as \$2,125. Assuming that he divided this three ways, with two shares going to his partners, Leslie Hawker and Harry Hawker, Carbral would receive \$708 as his weekly share. This would amount to exactly \$38,816 at the end of the year.

Hinton—Mrs. William Ramsey, 63 years old, is dead as a result of injuries sustained when she fell down five steps at her home.

Fairmont—The John Russo wholesale fruit produce store here was destroyed by fire with a loss of several thousand dollars. It is believed that the building took fire from an overheated stove. The building, a frame structure, was burned down and the entire contents including a heavy consignment of fruit and vegetables destroyed.

Morgantown—A total of 1,378 students have registered at the office of the financial secretary for the spring semester of West Virginia university.

Bluefield—A branch of the law school of West Virginia university will be established at Bluefield college here this summer, according to a plan approved by the state board of education and university authorities.

Morgantown—Out of a total of 1,000 students at West Virginia university, only 470 displayed enough interest in the honor system to vote when the question was submitted to the student body during registration, according to figures made public by Robert Kelly, president of the student council.

Huntington—Organization of the Consolidated Power and Light company, with a capital stock of \$5,000,000, was announced by T. M. Hays, assistant gen. manager of the Consolidated Light, Heat and Power company. Corporation papers have been granted by Secretary of State Houston G. Young.

Huntington—The Huntington Tri-State fair and fall racing meet will be held here September 24 to 29, inclusive, it was announced by the board of directors of the fair association. It is probable that the state convention of the Benevolent Protective Order of Elks and a state meeting of the American Legion will be held here at the same time.

Wheeling—Suit for half a million dollars was brought in federal court here against Marcel Joffe, Fairmont millionaire, by A. E. Bailey, of Pittsburgh, organizer of the Federal Carbonic company of Fairmont. The suit is based on a charge of malicious prosecution, growing out of Bailey's trial and acquittal at Fairmont a year ago, of a charge of embezzling \$150,000.

Bluefield—Thirteen families were made homeless when fire of unknown origin destroyed the old Princeton inn, at Princeton. In recent years the structure has been used as an apartment house and was owned by Captain L. H. Perkins. The building was a brick and frame structure, the brick addition having been made a few years ago. The entire building and contents were a total loss.

Wheeling—The deadly monoxide fumes from an open gas stove claimed two more victims here when the bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Allan Grove were found in bed at their home on Wheeling Island. They had not been seen for 24 hours, and when neighbors broke into the apartment the bodies were discovered. A physician expressed the opinion that death had come within two or three hours.

Charleston—Seventy-five dollars were ordered paid to B. A. Robinson, Kanawha Two-Mile farmer, by the county court for the loss of three pure-bred sheep in November, 1921. The sheep were killed by dogs, and Mr. Robinson brought a claim for \$90 before the court several days ago. Mr. Robinson told the court that his sheep were valued at \$30 each and that he could sell them at such a price. He asked \$90 each, but accepted \$25.

Clarksburg—Four members of the federal internal revenue forces in West Virginia have gone to New York city to take part in an investigation by a picked group of 100 revenue agents of the alleged failure of thousands of persons to file income tax reports. They are: Ross J. Sears, Moundsville; Mark Flaherty, Parkersburg; C. J. Smith, Huntington; and Clarence Morris, Charleston. The men were chosen in a competitive examination in which 3,000 revenue agents participated. West Virginians ranked first, Pennsylvania second and New York third.

Charleston—The state road commission will supplement the local district bond issue of \$25,000 with an equal if not a larger amount for the purpose of building a road toward the Jackson county line, the county court was informed by a representative of the commission. The road will be built from the end of the present hard surface by way of Sissonville to the line of the neighboring county. Rights-of-way for a distance of seven miles along the proposed route have been decided free of consideration to the state, the court was told.

Huntington—Dr. D. B. Bodenheimer, of Logan, was arrested by United States Deputy Marshal E. E. Buskirk, at Logan, charged with violation of the anti-narcotic law. He was taken before United States Commissioner J. P. Hager, at Covington, Ky., and held to the federal grand jury under \$10,000 bond. He was remanded to jail in Huntington when he was unable to furnish bail. He is alleged to have purchased unlawfully 1,000 half grains of morphine and 7,400 quarter grains of morphine sulphate. He is also charged with having disposed of it without making a record of its disposition.

Hinton—It was unofficially made known here that the Chesapeake and Ohio railroad company will construct at Clifton Forge, Va., a "hump" or gravity car switching yard at a cost of approximately \$4,000,000.

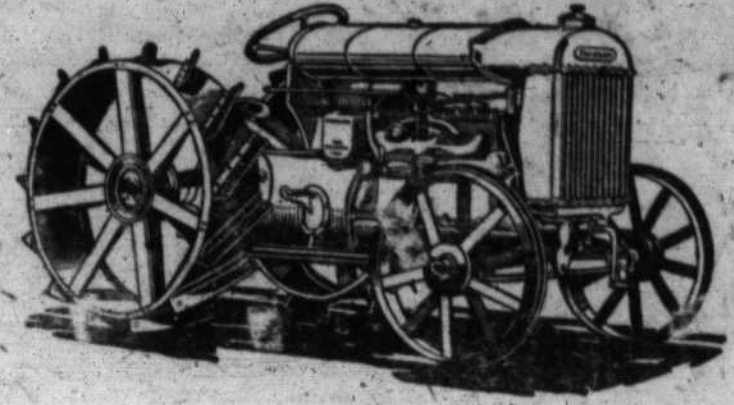
