NEW HOTEL

An architect has submitted tentative plans and drawings to the Marlinton Hotel Company for their new building and changes to the present structure. Everything will be of fire proof construction. The outside walls will be stuccoed.

The plans show 18 bed rooms each with a bath and all modern conveniences, large lobby, dining and sample rooms. The addition will be 13120 feet. The first floor will have two business rooms and a big theatre opening on Main Street. The theatre auditorium will be 1611, including a commodious lobby and adequate stage.

The proposed improvements and additional building are estimated to cost about \$10,000. It is expected to let the contract in time to have the building under roof and the heating plant installed before cold weather.

This assures the town of Marlinton an adequate, modern hotel.

Dr. A. C. Jones passed away peacefully at his home, in Bath Street, Covington, Sunday, July 15, 1923, after a lingering illness. Dr. Jones was born at Lee Hill, Highland county, Va., February 11, 1871, and was 52 years, 5 months and 1 day old.

After taking an academic course of one year at V. P. I., he graduated in medicine with high honors at the University of Virginia in 1895. For some time he was professor of anatomy at that institution, moving to this city in October, 1899, where he practiced medicine successfully and continuously until February of this year when he was stricken with Bright's disease.

He was the coach of the football team of the University for one year before his graduation, and later coached the V. P. I. team for two years.

At the age of 34, Dr. Jones married Miss Annie Shanahan, June 5, 1905. They have two sons, A. C. Jr., and Joseph F. Jones, who survive. He also leaves his father, Dr. Henry Harrison Jones; four sisters, Mrs. H. M. Moore and Mrs. Sidney Wilton, of Dunmore, W. Va.; Mrs. Elmer Moore, of Minnehaha Springs, W. Va.; and Mrs. M. E. Hansel, of Medane, N. C., and one brother, Hal C. Jones, who is connected with the State Highway Commission at Greenwood, S. C.

Dr. Jones was a man of many sterling qualities, and all who knew him learned to love him. He was a physician of unusual ability and enjoyed an enviable practice here. He will be missed as much as well as a doctor, as in the whole community mourns his passing. —Covington Virginian.

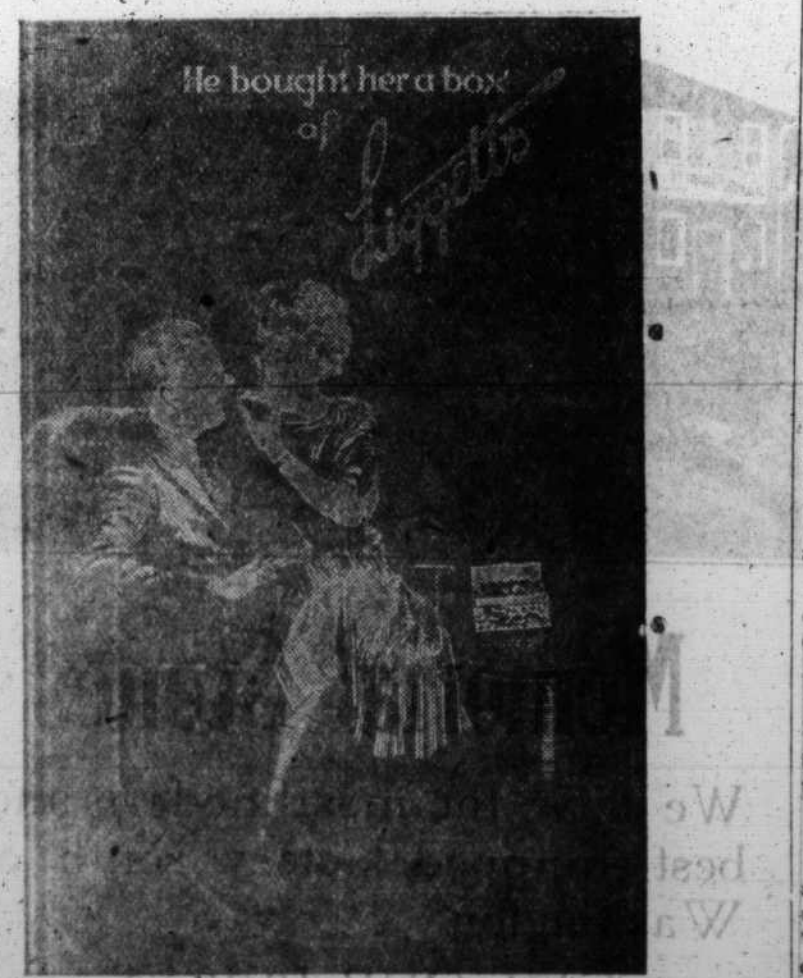
