M. E. CHURCH REUNION

A plan for the reunion of the Northern and Southern division of Methodist Episcopal church was taken under consideration by the joint commission on unification at Cleveland, Ohio, after having been approved by members representing both branches at separate meetings.

The plan drafted by a joint commission of sixteen, was adopted unanimously by the northern members at a meeting on the afternoon of the 21st inst. The southern members made a few changes in the wording of the plan which was then submitted to the joint commission.

Confidence that the differences in the wording of the plan would be ironed out and the branch which arose in 1845 over the question of slavery would be healed, was expressed by members of the joint commission as they went into session.

Approval of the plan means the possibility of a united church by 1925, according to Dr. A. W. Harris, general secretary of the board of education of the northern branch and secretary of its unification commission.

If reunion occurs, the Methodist Episcopal church will be the first of the three great protestant denominations which divided over the question of slavery, to become reconciled.

The plan, Dr. Harris said, provides only that each church change its constitution, so that instead of holding separate general conferences every four years, the two general conferences will be merged.

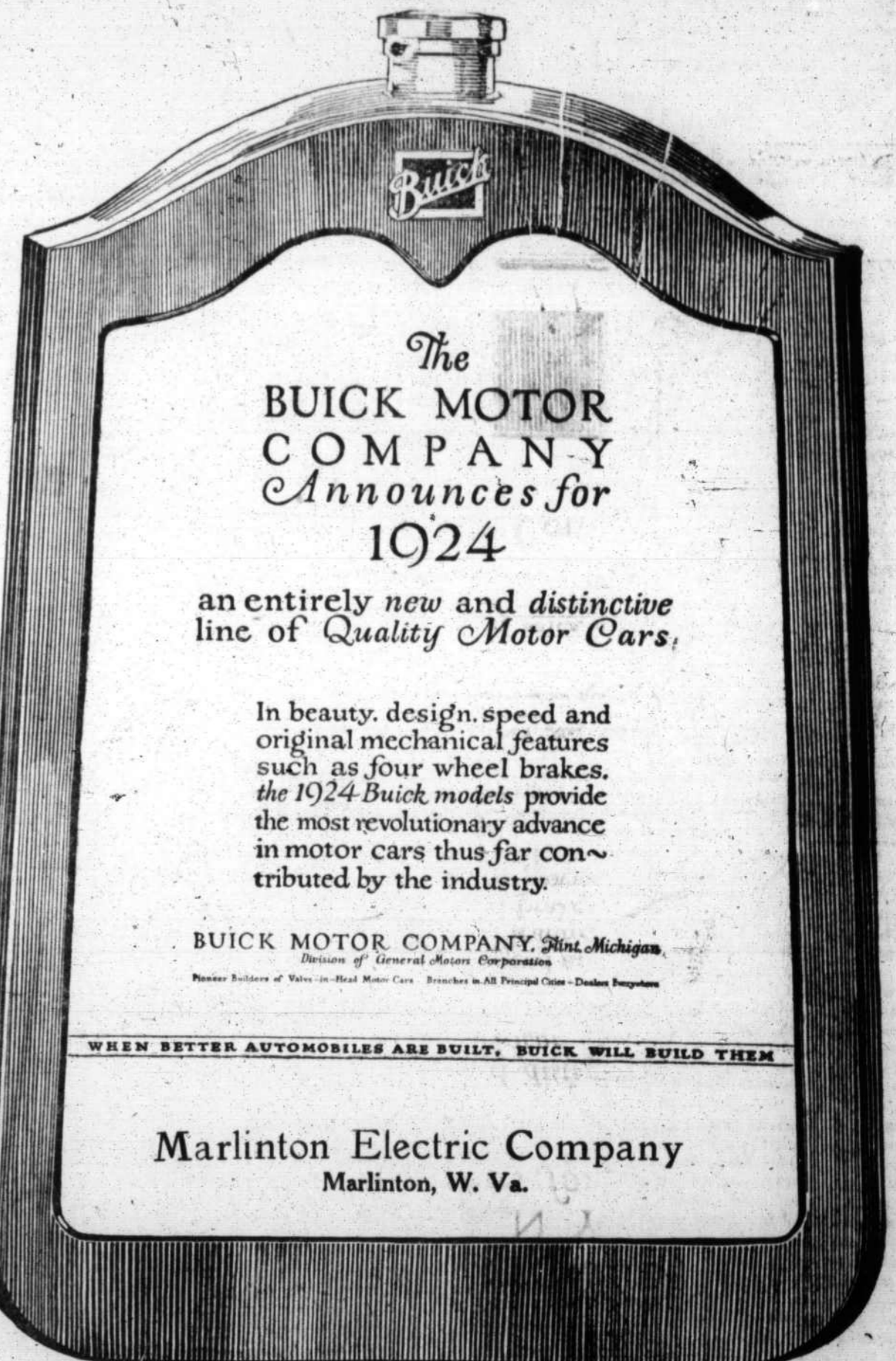
