





DECLARES STATE HEALTH COM: MISSIONER HENSHAW-VAC-CINATION SURE PREVEN-TATIVE

f Every Child In The State Were Given the Taxin-Antitoxin Treatment There Would Be No Diphtheria, Is Statement Made-Legislative Aid Is

Deaths of children resulting from diphtheria can be prevented, is the statement of State Health Commissioner Henshaw in discussing the usnal increasing prevalence of the disease in the fall of the year, and he alds that all diphtheria among children can be prevented by simple and painless vaccination.

A record on file in the health d partment of 8,372 cases of dipl. labels shows the increase in death rate where the use of antitoxin was delay Where 624 persons were given antitoxin on the first day, only deaths occurred. In 2,181 cases anti toxin was administered on the second day and 33 deaths resulted or 1.51 per cent of the total. When antitoxin was given on the third day, 3.38 per cent dled; when given on the fourth, 11.15 per cent died, and when given

on the fith, 22.01 per cent. The State Health Department re quested the 1923 legislature to appropriate money for the purpose of supplying free toxin-antitoxin and other vaccine lymph for demics, but the bill did not pass, .
