J. C. KINNISON

J. Clayborne Kinnison died very suddenly at his home near Lobelia last Saturday morning, September 22, 1923. He was out in his field and suffered an attack of heart disease, and died in a few minutes. He was past 80 years of age. Among his children are W. W. and Edward Kinnison. The deceased was one of the county's best citizens. Burial at the Hill graveyard Sunday afternoon.

Dogs made a raid on the flocks of John W. Moore and Andrew Moorn on the mountain opposite Marlinton last Friday morning. About a half-dozen sheep were killed or badly injured and others are missing. A big old hound was killed in the act of chasing a sheep, and two other dogs got away. This is the second time in six months and the third time in a year that these flocks have suffered from town dogs. Many farmers have quit trying to keep sheep because of the dog nuisance.

Our friend Harvey Cromer had a narrow escape from serious injury one day last week. He was looking some timber land on Red Lick Mountain, and came to a deep ravine bridged by a big fallen sugar tree. The tree looked safe, but when he was in the middle of it, it broke in two and Mr. Cromer fell a distance of fifteen feet or more into a rocky stream bed. He suffered a badly sprained back, but was able to make his way back to town.

Up to September 22, County Clerk S. L. Brown had issued 1603 hunting and fishing licenses. This is nearly as many as were issued in the whole year of 1922.

SALE OF CLOVERLICK PLANT

By a deed dated September 15, 1923, A. D. Noll conveyed to the Raine Lumber Company, the sawmill and railroad and timber at Clover Lick, in consideration of the sum of \$230,000.00. The deal transfers about five thousand acres of timber in the Greenbank and Huntersville districts. A hand mill at Clover Lick, the railroad, engine, bridge, houses, office and so forth. The railroad is built up Laurel Run and Thomas Creek and passes over the divide to the waters of Thorny Creek.

Mr. Joe Rains of the Raine Lumber Company will be active man in charge of the work. He is a son of the well known Thomas Raine, and represents the second generation of a very important lumber family of Pennsylvania.

The revenue stamps on the deed amounted to \$230.00. A good deal of the timber conveyed lies on the road between Huntersville and Dunmore and is a well known forest.
