U. C. V. APPOINTMENTS

Gen. W. B. Haideman, of Louisville, Ky. has appointed Commander in-Chief U. C. V. Thos. H. Dennis, of Lewisburg, late Commander of the First Brigade, West Virginia Division, to succeed General Charles S. Peyton, deceased, as commander of the division and directs him to proceed with diligence to secure a re-organization and establishment in good standing of the Confederate camps, wherever practicable in the various counties in which they, heretofore existed.

In the execution of this purpose and the re-establishment of the West Virginia Division Gen. Dennis has appointed Capt. Henry C. Byrns, of Monroe county, Adjutant General and Chief-of-Staff of the division (other staff appointments to be announced later) and has appointed Hon. Mathew John McNeel brigadier general commanding the First Pocahontas Brigade W. Va. Division, who will shortly announce his personal staff.

Owing to the inevitable depletion of the membership of the camps caused by death and the infirmities of age Gen. Dennis feels that the task assigned him will not be easy of accomplishment, but hopes that the zeal of his old comrades and their loyalty to the great principles for which all fought will bring a hearty response to his appeal from every Veteran yet loyal to his principles and to the organization formed, nearly forty years ago, to secure a true history of the great Civil War and to do justice to the memory of him and his comrades who volunteered to fight and die if need be in defense of home and fireside.

RICHARD CALLISON

Richard Callison who for the past five years has been an invalid from nervous trouble died at his home in Lewisburg Sunday December 2, 1923. He was a son of Josiah and Nancy Hill Callison of Beard, and was born and reared in Pocahontas county and was the youngest of a family of eight children, one sister Mrs. James K. Bright, of Hillsboro survives, she being the oldest child of the family. October 26, 1887 he was married to Miss Fannie Cameron Beard, of Hillsboro, and to this union seven children were born two of them preceding him to the grave.

In 1911 he moved to Lewisburg for the purpose of educating his sons. He with the oldest members of his family united with the M. E. Church South, he was elected on the Board of Stewards and served in this capacity until his death. The funeral services were conducted at his home Monday afternoon at four o'clock by his pastor Rev. D. A. Berry and Tuesday morning the remains were taken to Beard, for burial in the Old Droop church burying ground where at two o'clock with appropriate services by Rev. D. A. Berry and Rev. J. C. Johnson of Hillsboro, he was laid to rest by his two children Jimmie Franklin who died in infancy and H. Gerrell who died at the age of 19 years.

Mr. Callison was loyal and consistent member of his church a devoted husband and father and a constant and true friend. His wife Mrs. Fannie Callison, his sons, D. M. and wife and E. B. of Beard, J. W. and wife of Millburn, Dr. G. S. of Marlinton, O. G. of Firelow, Miss Nannie Beard, of Lewisburg and Mrs. Carl G. Beard of Hillsboro and a number of friends and relatives accompanied his remains to their last resting place. The pall bearers were: J. M. Watts, J. E. Bass, H. F. Zimmerman, C. L. Carr, H. R. Lipps and E. B. Farrier.

The grave was covered with beautiful flowers a tribute of love and respect from friends and loved ones.

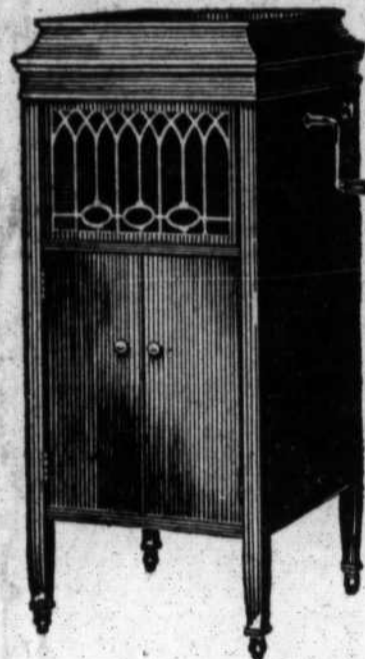
