CORNER STONE LAYING

OF BEARD CHAPEL, PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

Impressive Ceremonies by State Masonic Grand Lodge Grand Master Samuel T. Spears Present.

With impressive ceremonies the cornerstone of Beard Chapel, the new Presbyterian church being built at Beard, Pocahontas county, was laid last Wednesday at noon by the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of West Virginia. The weather was most favorable for an occasion of this kind and the day is one long to be remembered in the history of this Church. The occasion was honored by the presence of the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Samuel T. Spears, of Elkins, West Virginia, in person.

The Grand Lodge congregated in the Beard school house with the following officers:

The Grand Lodge was formed in procession by the Grand Marshal, with the ladies of the Hillsboro Chapter No. 93, Order of the Eastern Star as an escort, marched from the Lodge room to the site of the new church, where, after Rev. J. C. Johnson, pastor of the church, extended an invitation upon the behalf of the session and the building committee of the church, the Grand Master with the assistance of the Grand Lodge laid the corner stone according to the ancient and established usages and customs of the craft.

The following is a list of the articles deposited in the corner stone: A Holy Bible, a list of the officers and members of the Oak Grove Presbyterian Church; a list of the officers and members of Pocahontas Lodge; the names of the officers of the Grand Lodge; a picture of Oak Grove church; a picture of Wesley Chapel church; a picture of the Hillsboro high school building; a shorter catechism, a child's catechism, a copy of Onward; a copy of the Christian Observer, a foreign coin by W. M. Irvine; a list of the contributors to Beard Chapel; a list of the committee in charge of Beard Chapel; two coins belonging to Jacob W. Beard, deceased, contributed by his son Henry Harper Beard; a short narrative of the beginning of Beard Chapel by Rev. J. C. Johnson; two pictorial Bible lessons; two coins by Mr. and Mrs. R. M. Beard; list of members of chapter No. 93 O. E. S.; a coin found by the side of the road on the march from Lodge room to the church; a list of members of Marlinton Lodge No. 137.

After the ceremonies were over at the request of the Grand Master, the Rev. Warren H. DuBose, of Lewisburg, delivered a very appropriate and instructive address. The Hon. John W. Arbuckle, who acted as eulogist, responded and gave a most interesting and reminiscent address upon the church and the older people of the community who were leaders of church work in this county several years ago.

The ladies of the church provided a bountiful and well served luncheon in the little grove near the church and realized about \$160.00 net, which fund is to be used in purchasing furniture for the new Chapel, which the ladies have undertaken to do.

The church is located near the home of Mrs. Blanche Beard Hamrick, upon land owned by Henry Harper Beard, a direct descendant of Josiah Beard, the first Elder of the Oak Grove church, founded and organized in the early part of the last century.

This church began a few years ago with a weekly prayer meeting. In the fall of 1921 the pastor assisted by Rev. W. B. Grove held an evangelistic meeting and a number were added to the church. The membership is now about twenty, but the members of other denominations are joining with these christians and working hand in hand for the Master's cause without regard to creed or denomination.

The finance committee is composed of R. M. Beard, W. T. Poague and J. G. Hamrick. The building committee is R. M. Beard, J. V. May, J. H. Kincaid, W. T. Poague, J. G. Hamrick, and M. D. Darnell.

Austin Myers is the architect and foreman and the work is progressing rapidly under his supervision.

The day was bright and warm and the ceremonies were beautiful and impressive.

Morgantown--Sixty-five students of the University of West Virginia will graduate in June, it was announced here. This is one of the largest classes ever graduated from the university.

Moundsville--Howard Wall, colored, who escaped from the insane asylum at Weston nearly a month ago, was apprehended in Pittsburgh and has been returned to the West Virginia penitentiary.

Moundsville--Local man institutes proceedings against the Wheeling traction company alleging a conductor threw him bodily from one of the company's cars during a dispute over paying his fare.

Bluefield--Moonshiners in Virginia apparently set a trap for raiding prohibition officers, for at one place the officers found a big steel bear trap set to catch intruders. It failed to nab anyone however.

Martinsburg--Leo M. Sullivan, nineteen years old, self-confessed moonshiner, was in court here sentenced to two years' imprisonment at Moundsville prison and fined \$300, the minimum penalty for his offense.

Wheeling--In conference with President Frank Ledvinka and other officials of sub-district 5 of district 6, United Mine Workers, Mayor John B. Wyatt of Bellaire, O., and Mayor Howard Duff of Martin's Ferry, O., arranged for coal operation of the municipal light and water plants of those cities.

Huntington--The secretary of the Interior has given the Land and Export corporation of Huntington, W. Va., until July 15 to complete an investigation of two Alaska coal mines and their possible markets, with a view to leasing them. These mines were formerly operated by the navy department but have been turned over to the interior department for operation, and a lease is planned.

Bluefield--The Bluefield Daily Telegraph began the printing of the New Testament in serial form and will, according to Colonel H. I. Shott, editor and owner, continue the practice until the final chapter of Revelations has appeared in its columns. Every morning, under a double column heading "Read the Bible with us," will appear parts of the New Testament, exactly as it appears in the bound volume of the Bible.

Wheeling--A Jury in the U. S. district court returned a verdict finding Astor L. Diamond, a rural school teacher of Barbour county, not guilty of raising a \$1 bill to a \$10 note. Diamond was charged with raising the note and passing it in Clarksburg in January, 1921. The defendant testified that he only passed on the raised bill, which he had accepted in good faith from a store, not knowing that it was raised from a one dollar bill.

Clarksburg--Word was received here that four prominent Clarksburg business men experienced an automobile accident near Staunton, Va., while on a tour of the Shenandoah Valley and that one of them, W. M. B. Sine, ice cream manufacturer, was hurt so badly that he had to be taken to a hospital at Staunton. He suffered a broken jaw and numerous scratches and bruises. Others in the party were Galvin Williams, H. D. Talbot, and Wade Garrett and they escaped injury.

Charleston--State Labor Commissioner Daugherty has been appointed federal director of employment in West Virginia, according to a letter he received from Francis I. Jones, the national director, at Washington.

Morgantown--Robert Kelley, of Sutton, a junior in the college of Law, was elected president of the student council of West Virginia University at the annual election. Kelley was given a vote of 882 while his opponent, Marion Hersman of Grants Hill, drew 300 votes.


