### CAPTAIN GILMORE DEAD

Dr. E. G. Herold was called to Highland County on Sunday by the death of his grandfather, Captain Samuel Gilmore, which occurred on July 29, 1922. For some time he had been in failing health, and a few days previous to his death he had a fall and a stroke of paralysis. He was nearly 87 years of age. He was one of the prominent citizens of Highland County, and was widely known in Pocahontas county. During the Civil War he served as a Confederate soldier, being Captain of Co. E, 32nd Virginia Infantry. Funeral services on Monday in charge of the Masons, of which order he had been a member for 58 years.

### POCAHONTAS MARBLE

At a meeting of the Board of Trade Monday night the matter of bringing the great deposits of marble in Pocahontas County to the attention of the State Capitol Commission was brought up. Hubert Echols has already had some correspondence in regard to the using of this stone for the new building, and J. S. McNeel offers to allow them to get the marble on his land free of charge. Mr. Mr. Echols has sent off samples of the stone and had it dressed; and the polished stone looks the finest of all. The Board of Trade asked Mr. Echols to go to Charleston at their expense and take the matter up personally with the Capitol Commission. He went Tuesday afternoon.

Many years ago, the late captain Wm. McNeel and others employed a geologist to make a report on the marble deposits of the Little Levels. He found an immense amount of what he pronounced a very superior grade of marble.

## CALL FOR DEMOCRATIC DISTRICT CONVENTIONS

At a meeting of the Democratic Executive Committee of Pocahontas County, West Virginia, held at the Court House of said County, in the town of Marlinton, on Monday, the 31st day of July 1922.

There were present W. H. Barlow, H. H. Hudson, Samuel Sheets, A. C. Stillwell and Dr. E. G. Herold, by proxy, being a majority of all the members of this Committee.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, the following order and resolution was adopted: Whereas Section 29 of Chapter 79 of the acts of the Legislature of West Virginia, Session of 1919, makes it the duty of the County Executive Committee to arrange for mass conventions to be held in each of the magisterial districts of the County for the purpose of selecting delegates to the Democratic State Convention to be held in the City of Charleston on the 15th day of August 1922 for the purpose of nominating a candidate for Judge of the Supreme Court of Appeals and adopting a party platform, as provided for in the call issued by the Democratic State Committee:

Therefore, be it resolved: That pursuant to said Section 29 of Chapter 79 of the Acts of 1919 and the call of the Democratic State Committee, of Pocahontas County, West Virginia, hereby calls mass conventions to be held by the Democratic voters of said County at the places in the several districts thereof as herein after designated on Tuesday, the 8th day of August 1922, at the hour of 2 o'clock P. M. for the purpose of selecting delegates and alternates to the Democratic State Convention to be held in the City of Charleston, West Virginia on the 15th day of August 1922 for the purpose of nominating a candidate for Judge of the Supreme Court of Appeals and adopting a party platform, and which mass conventions for the several magisterial districts of this County shall be held at the following places in the respective districts:

- For Greenbank District: At the High School building in the village of Greenbank.
- For Edray District: At the Court House in the Town of Marlinton.
- For Huntersville District: At the school house in the village of Huntersville.
- For Little Levels District: At the High School building in the Town of Hillsboro.

It shall be the duty of the members of this Committee, in each respective district, to attend said mass conventions and to call the conventions to order and designate the temporary Chairman and Secretary thereof. And in case no member of this Committee be present, then some known Democrat shall call the convention to order and in like manner designate the temporary organization.

Each of the said mass conventions shall appoint one delegate for each one hundred votes or fraction thereof of more than fifty cast in each respective district at the November 1920 election for Honorable James M. Cox for President, that is to say, the said district mass convention shall appoint the following number of delegates:

- Greenbank District: Eleven Delegates.
- Edray District: Six Delegates.
- Huntersville District: Two Delegates.
- Little Levels District: Six Delegates.

And said mass conventions shall also appoint a like number of alternates who shall, in the absence of the delegates, be empowered to cast

the vote of the said respective districts in the said State convention.

And the Chairman and Secretary of each district convention shall certify the action of said convention to this Committee, to a meeting of the same, required by law to be held, and which is hereby called to meet at the Court House in the Town of Marlinton at 2 o'clock P. M. on Thursday, the 10th day of August 1922.

Be it further resolved: That the Chairman and Secretary of this Committee are directed to certify a copy of this resolution to the Democratic State Convention to be held in the City of Charleston on the 15th day of August 1922, and to publish the same in The Pocahontas Times.

### DISTRICT CONVENTION

Pursuant to a call made by the State Republican Executive Committee, District Mass Convention of the Republican Party are hereby called to convene in the several Magisterial Districts of Pocahontas County on Tuesday the 8th day of August, 1922, at one o'clock P. M. for the following purposes: To select delegates to represent said district in Republican state convention called to convene in the City of Huntington, at 10 o'clock A. ## STATE CONVENTION

Charleston, W. Va., July 31.—The Democratic Judicial convention for the purpose of nominating a candidate for the state supreme court has been called by State Chairman R. F. Dunlap, of Hinton, to be held in Charleston August 15.

State Chairman Dunlap is notifying the various county chairmen of the convention date and instructing them to call mass conventions of Democratic voters in each district for the purpose of naming delegates to the state convention. Each county is entitled to one delegate for each one 100 voters.

A meeting of the Democratic State executive committee will be held in Charleston the evening of August 14, Chairman Dunlap also announces. This meeting, the chairman says is for the purpose of "outlining the work for the coming campaign and to consider such other matters as may be deemed of importance."

"Considerable interest has already been awakened," says Chairman Dunlap. "In both the meeting of the executive committee and the judicial convention. The prospects of Democratic success in the general election in November are unusually bright. The people as a whole appear to be sick and tired of Republican 'Normalcy' and the Republican legislative officers in both state and nation will be repudiated by West Virginians as they have been in a large majority of instances in other states where an expression of sentiment concerning Republican administration of public affairs has been given at the polls recently."

Indications are that "there will be a record attendance at the convention this year," the Democratic chairman says, estimating that there will be from 750 to 1,000 party workers "from every corner of the state," here, including delegates and other interested Democrats. The convention will be held in the Kanawha county court house, according to tentative arrangements.

Announcement of the convention date is expected to "bring to light some good available timber" for the post. Judge James A. Meredith, of Fairmont, who was appointed to fill an unexpired term on the state supreme bench, is a candidate to succeed himself on the Republican ticket, and indications are that he will get the nomination unopposed. Judge John Mitchell Woods, of the Jefferson-Morgan-Berkeley circuit court, who is presiding over the trials at Charles Town of union miners charged with participating in the armed march on Logan and Mingo counties last summer, has been frequently mentioned in Democratic newspapers as the possible nominee of the Democratic convention.

Mr. and Mrs. Emerick left Charleston immediately after the ceremony by motor to the lakes and through Canada on their honeymoon, they will be at home in Charleston. Gazette.
