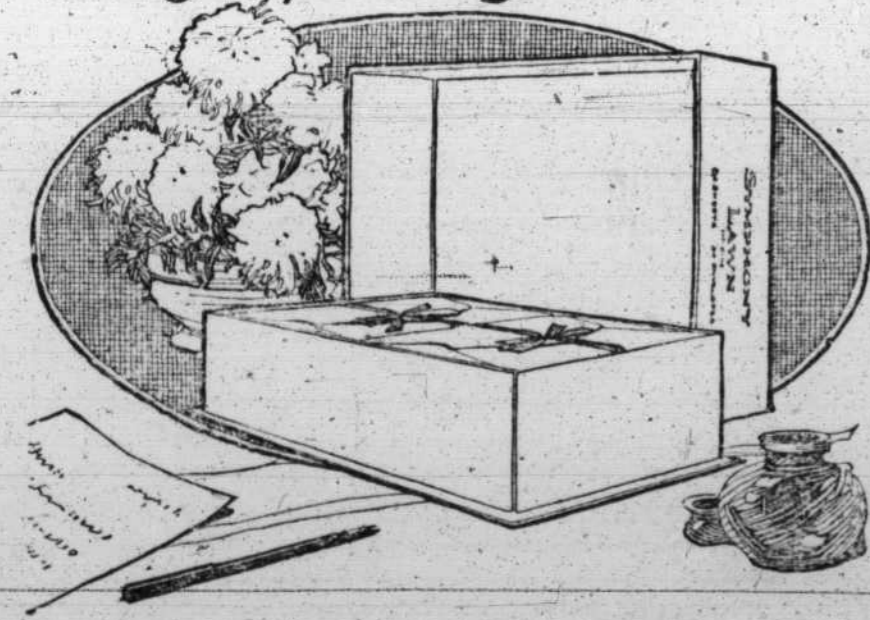

The West Virginia Farmers' Cooperative Warehouse Association was organized in Clarksburg on March 17th. This organization was formed primarily for the pooling of wool but may be used for the handling of other farm products and the purchase of farm supplies. It is incorporated and has a board of directors; namely, John W. Smith of Weston, President; A. R. Leatherman of Keyser, Vice President; J. D. McReynold of Clarksburg Secretary-Treasurer. Commodious warehouse space with the best of facilities for the grading and handling of wool at a very nominal figure has been secured.

Mr. Leatherman is now in charge of the wool pool. D. E. Crane, extension potato specialist, was in Pocahontas county the past week and visited many of the important potato men in the Greenbank district. Mr. Crane does not look for an over-production of this crop in West Virginia, because a train load of potatoes 23 miles long would represent the amount of potatoes shipped into this state annually. Too many local men consider only the county market, and do not take into account the large mining sections which annually depend upon the Northern States for their supply. He also lays stress on the necessity for spraying.

Fred Pritchard of Dunmore has recently completed a West Virginia Type of Poultry House according to specifications given out by the Extension Department. The actual cash outlay for this house amounted to less than \$25 because the owner had sufficient material on his own farm. This is the second house of this kind in this county.

John Bather of Pickens, W. Va., spends a day in the county recently to explain the construction of dipping vats large enough to accommodate all classes of livestock. Mr. Bather states that there are three of these vats in Randolph county and that there are no lice in the communities where these vats are located. This is the only practical method for ridding cattle of lice.

Many farmers have been purchasing 18 per cent acid Phosphate from the Farm Bureau at the same price that 16 per cent fertilizer is being sold for.

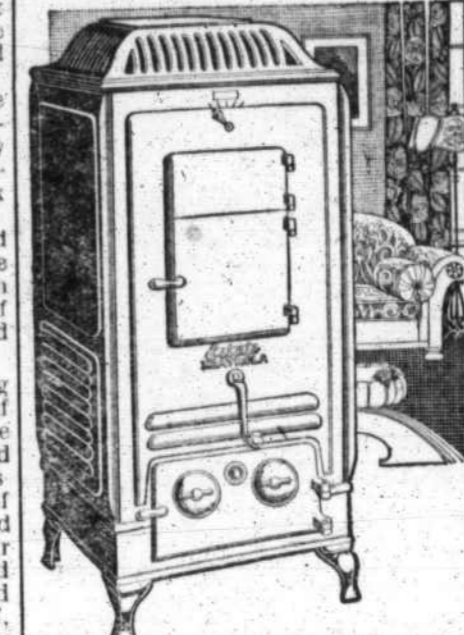
