### CAMPING TIME

Camping time is here. Camping is no longer considered a frolic, but an agency of service in the community and county. Camping is an educational institution with definite objectives in view: campercraft, first aid, personal health, handicraft, recreation, games, music, social manners, leadership. Camping is a process of building and molding manly and womanly qualities in our citizenry. It is an antidote for the luxuries and softening influences of the modern home. Campers are put on their metal, they carry their load, make their own beds, wash their own dishes and learn to work. Camping affords an opportunity for fellowship, comradeship and fraternity. Camping with its accessory activities is God's best provision for health, pleasure, fellowship and joy. The study periods, the 4-H charism, athletic games, the council circle, the campfire, the vesper services, the chow call, the mess line, the tribes, all have a purpose and to go make a camp complete and to develop men and women.

Fill out the card completely, answer all questions. The 4-H's men, the health H, the head H, the hand H and the heart H. You win at camp by being chartered. If you have not been chartered you do not have any of these H's. I want all the club members over fifteen years of age to be chartered and try for their 4-H's, get as many as you can.

We have two camps because we cannot accommodate them all in the one camp. In the first camp we are asking for the older club members. In the second camp for those not in the first. Each club member will receive a letter giving his or her camp when to attend, what to bring and what to do, about the first of July. We want you in one camp if you cannot attend the first, be with us in the second. The camp is for those club members who have completed their projects and have their club work up to date. This 4-H club is not a social organization just merely to have a good time and not do any work. Heretofore any club member has been allowed to attend camp and no questions were asked. We want you to follow Roosevelt's saying: "when you play, play hard; when you work, don't play at it."

We are expecting to have a 4-H Chorus, a 4-H orchestra and some 4-H athletic teams for the fair. We want to develop and get organized during the camp and practise some for the fair and have these stunts ready for the first night. Monday of the fair. During the camp periods we want to pick out some definite objectives for the clubs in the county to work for. We want individual objectives, club objectives and now we are asking for some county 4-H objectives. Lets do something as a group for the county. We are requiring each club member to bring his or her illustrated booklets

to camp. Remember that your enrollment card in his office is the number given you in the chow line for the first day at camp. First come, first served.

A few more weeks and we will be ready for you.

### U. S. LOAN MONEY FOR LINE

When a man seventy three years old borrows money from Uncle Sam to line his land, it is time for younger men to sit up and take notice. At least, that is how your county agent felt when the following little article caught his eye in a late issue of the *Southern Agriculturalist*. No need to make any further comment, as the article tells its own story and carries its own point:

An advertisement asking 500 farmers to borrow money from the Federal Land Bank for the purchase of lime, phosphate, clover and dairy cow, appeared in a newspaper at Louisa, Ky., this spring. The advertisement was run in the paper by the local association of the Land Bank. It was developed to let the farmer understand, had the farmer understood that his Uncle Sam was ready and willing to furnish him money on a long time, installment plan if he would agree to use it for the upbuilding of his land and his livestock.

The advertisement was worth while. Small farmers from far back in the rough mountains of Laurel County secured loans. Mr. Alex Huff, who farms 60 acres of land, three miles from a lumber camp railroad, secured a loan of \$650 for lime and fertilizer early in April. The location of his farm will mean that his lime will be very expensive by the time it is on his land; but as he has many years in which to repay the cost of sweetening soil, it will be no hardship.

The farmer has an old farm and is getting along in years himself, will probably read the article, shake his head and then mutter, "I'm too old to begin thinking and all these newer wrinkles." The old saying, "You can't teach an old dog new tricks" still holds good. But in Mr. Huff's case the old adage doesn't hold good. Mr. Huff's application for the loan gives his age as 73 years.

### DAMS ON NEW RIVER

By legal publication in The Tribune today the New-Kanawha Power Company gives notice of its intention to apply to the Public Service Commission on July 31, for permit to construct two dams in New River, between Hawks Nest and Gauley Junction. Construction of the dams is for the purpose of developing some 75,000 horse power by the utilization of the natural fall of 148 feet in the flow of the river between these points.

Behind the movement for one of the largest hydro electric power developments in the country is the Union Carbide Company, of New York. The plans have been under consideration for several years and it will be 2 or 3 more years before the dam and tremendous power of the river along one of its roughest reaches of 10 miles is under man's control. An expenditure of 10 million dollars is contemplated to carry out the engineering program, so thoroughly worked out.

The dams to be constructed will not be high ones. The first one to be erected 3 miles below Hawks Nest will be only 36 feet high and the second one located one third of a mile above Gauley Junction, will be 47 feet high. These dams will form two pools extending about 10 miles.

Only a small area of land will be flooded on account of the canyon like character of the river bed. C & O railroad tracks will not be disturbed and there are no farms or homes along the course of the river to be abandoned. The Electro-Metallurgical Company, and other subsidiaries of the Union Carbide Company have owned most of the rights and land along the entire course for many years.

To overcome the crooked course of the river which forms almost a half circle after leaving Hawks Nest, the power company will carry the water on a direct line to Gauley Junction through two tunnels. Each of these tunnels to be bored through solid rock, will be approximately one mile long. They will be about 20 feet in diameter. As each of these tunnel outlets will be located the hydro electric power stations. A fall of 74 feet in the water at each point will develop the water will develop 35,000 to 50,000 horsepower at each point.

This power, almost too vast for comprehension, is to be utilized by the subsidiary companies of the Union Carbide Company, such as the plant of the Electro Metallurgical Company at Glen Ferris, which has been operated for more than 20 years. The Carbide and Carbon Chemical Corporation at South Charleston and on Blaine Island, and by other plants which the Carbide interests plan to construct in the Kanawha valley, possibly near Boomer.

The New Kanawha Power Company was chartered in West Virginia more than 2 year ago. Edward S. Whitney, of New York, is president. Engineering work is under direction of O. M. Jones whose headquarters are at Glen Ferris. A field engineer corps of a dozen men have been engaged for several months on the work. Osenton & Lee, Fayetteville, are attorneys for the corporation looking after local matters pertaining titles, rights of way and other legal matters—Fayette Tribune
