ARMY AND NAVY MEET

Or words to that effect were sung by a chorus of voices that neither cheered nor inebriated—just drove one crazy—but I enjoyed it all.

The occasion was a banquet given in honor of Captain Paul Kellam by fellow officers at Marlinton Sewell Hotel last Saturday night. Fifty-six guests fetched up to the board and these were the officers and their ladies of the Marlinton sector and some from the adjoining sectors of Lewisburg and Elkins. There were present two civilians, John Sydenstricker and this editor, to add dignity and respectability to the occasion. A good time was had by all.

Colonel Forster as toastmaster called the lines and responses were made by Captain Kellam, Captain Burkhalter, and Superintendent Sydney Neese of Camp Watoga, and then Captain Howery swung into action with a whole platoon of speakers—Lt. Riley, Captain Calhoun, Lt. O'Brien, and Captain Hline.

Captain Kellam is retiring as commander of the Marlinton sector, in charge of the army part of eight CCC camps. The banquet was taken of the love and esteem his officers have for him. Knowing the sorry feeling officers of the line have for quartermaster service, and how referred to that branch, I came "high writing" the meeting was held in respect to his memory.

Captain Kellam is a fine man and able officer; of modest disposition he was about ready for transfer from our midst before most of us got to know him and appreciate his quality. He is succeeded in command by Colonel Forster. The captain's reputation here as gentlemen and officer will make the way easier for his successor than he found it.

It was a grand affair this gathering of officers of the army and the navy, who have charge of the CCC camps of the Marlinton Sector. I take it, Captain Kellam is the last professional soldier in this sector; the personnel of the officers at headquarters and in the camps now being from the officers reserve corps of the army and the navy.
