

was called spirifer pennatus. The word brachlopoda means armfooted. When people first began to figure about these little fellows, it was thought the little animals crawled on their arms. They know better now, but the name got put down in che book and it hangs to this day You know the saying about giving a dog a bad name.

The two more or less louped or spirally rolled arms attract currents of water into the shell, bringing in food for the stomach and oxygen for the respiratory organs.

The one Moody brought is of the spiral kind, and that pennatus word is from the latin, meaning feathered or winged. It appears it can be loose ly translated flyer. The word pen comes from the same source, but this gen of mine never flies anywhere except off the track. From the butterfly appearance of this brachiopod it is listed in the book, by translation, the winged spiral The armfooters are probably our

oldest families, persisting through all the ages and changes from the time of the hard white rocks-Canbrianwere laid down at Minnehaha Springs even unto this day. However, they say there are now only about 160 living forms in our present seas, while the rock holds fecords of fully 7000 kinds. I am not prepared to say that the winged spirals are among armfooters which have persisted to this time, but I have my doubts. I see the one called tongue and head brach opods, from their shapes, are the ones which have persisted for the longest times.
